# Minister's Letter.

#### Dear friends

Happy Easter. Christ is Risen! Christ is alive! Good News for anyone who cares to listen to the message. The newness of life that accompanies Spring we accept, often without thought. The story of Easter and the resurrection we know - not always remembering that our lives would have been very different without it. Ever since 325 AD, we celebrate Easter on the first Sunday that occurs after the first full moon following the vernal equinox (March 21st.) That's why the date of Easter changes from year to year. Easter will always be celebrated between March 22nd and April 25th and only between these dates.

How devastated the disciples must have been on hearing that Jesus' body had disappeared from the tomb. Then we hear of the encounter on the road to Emmaus (Luke 24:13 -35). An encounter with a stranger that only becomes clear as Jesus breaks the bread. This is when the story comes to life. This is the good news that Jesus lives. That he journeys with us and so we can encounter him in the most unlikely places. The two unknown disciples would never have dreamed of an encounter with Jesus on a dusty road. Yet that is where Jesus shows himself to us; in the ordinary, in the challenging.

The challenge in the coming weeks as we go about our ordinary lives is to be open to the possibility of meeting Jesus anew in the unexpected places; through unexpected encounters. Having our eyes opened just as the disciples eyes were opened.

mmaus Communities enable people to move on from homelessness, providing work and a home in a supportive, family environment. Companions (as those who live and work in Emmaus Communities are called) work full time collecting, renovating and reselling donated furniture. This work supports the Community financially and enables residents to develop skills, rebuild their self-respect and help others in greater need.

Companions receive accommodation, food, clothing and a small weekly allowance, but for many, the greatest benefit is a fresh start. To join a Community, they sign off unemployment benefits and agree to participate in the life and work of the Community and abide by its rules, for example not bringing drugs or alcohol into the Community.

Emmaus is a secular movement, spanning 36 countries, with 24 Communities in the UK. They rely on donations of good quality furniture and household goods from the public, which are sold in Emmaus shops. Each Community aims to become self-supporting, with any surplus donated to others in need.

There's an Emmaus shop in Bolton located at Derby Barracks, Fletcher Street and now also at 61 Knowsley Street. At the shops, you'll find a wide range of furniture including sofas, chairs, dining tables, wardrobes, chests of drawers and electrical goods such as stereos, TVs, kitchen utensils, and lamps. The shops also sell larger kitchen appliances and white goods: fridges, freezers, cookers etc. If it's smaller items you're looking for, you'll find a huge selection of bric-a-brac, crockery, glassware, collectables, records, pictures, books and much more.

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# Sunday School.

As I write this the snow has covered the ground and it feels like the Antarctic! What a strange Easter time it is. Sunday School would like to take this opportunity to wish you a Happy Easter and, fingers crossed, Spring will get a wriggle on then we can see the daffodils in their full glory and you never know, a bit of sunshine too!

Sunday School have as usual been busy with activities. Last time we wrote the children were off to enjoy their trip to the Chill Factor, where we were joined by our minister Mark and a few of the Elders. John certainly made an impression on the children, getting stuck in and launching himself down the snow slope! Fun was had by everyone, and thanks to all who came and helped out.

The Sunday School combined with Mark and Gill to organize a Family Fun Night that took place over the February half term. We had a few quizzes and some games that got us moving around the minor hall and church, and we shared a supper of pasties and peas. This event was well attended and everyone we spoke to seemed to have a good time - we are hoping to organize another one soon. Again this was another event where everyone pulled together to make it a success, so thanks to all those who helped out in some way.

We then began our journey through lent. We had a little bit of the history of Lent and what traditions people have and we read about Jesus being tempted by the Devil in the wilderness. We all then made a list (leaders included) of what we would



give up for lent. Everything from chocolate to television was on it and I think it's safe to say, some did better than others! We made a lenten calendar to help us count the days of Lent and put on it the

names of people to pray about as we went through the time of Lent.

Our older children stayed in for the Mothers' Day service. The children read out prayers and poems and Lucy and Charlotte played out a sketch. We also made cards and some chocolate boxes for our mums. The younger class decorated photo frames with a picture of themselves and talked about why mums were special. They shared what they had made with the congregation at the end of the service.

The older children will be staying in for more services

throughout the year and the next one will be Easter Day. With that in mind we wanted to explain and teach the children about communion. Our minister Mark organized a social event at church on a Saturday evening where the older children shared a meal



of pizza and lots of cake before having an informal talk from him about communion. The children asked lots of questions and then at the end had an opportunity to share in holy communion. Some did and some didn't, but it was lovely to be able to share that moment with the children. It was a positive experience, and thanks to Mark for organizing and delivering it so well.



Our Sunday school lessons then began to focus on Easter. We talked about the meal Jesus shared with Mary, Martha, Lazarus and Judas and how Mary used her hair to wash Jesus' feet with a very expensive perfume. We spoke about worth and what it really means and how the things we see as being worth a lot actually aren't the

most important. Leading on from that, both classes listened to the story of Palm Sunday and the events of Holy Week. The younger class shared in a last supper together and the older class had to walk a mile in Jesus' shoes during Holy Week.

Sermons will be our next big event and we are due to start practising the songs for May time. We also intend to do a cake stall after the Sermons service, but more info will follow. A few of our older children have had word back from the council regarding secondary schools and everyone of them has been accepted where they want to go.

As always, thank you to everyone for the support you give to Sunday School, from words of encouragement to helping out. It's all appreciated by all the leaders. Please keep the children in your thoughts and prayers
