DAY-TO-DAY BUSINESS OF BRAG

SO FAR

BRAG was formed this year (2009) by individuals interested in improving the village, with committee members from each area of Bryn to represent all the residents of Bryn.

The first week after the councillors' surgery in October, we had a team in Bryn cutting the grass, collecting litter, trimming back the excessive undergrowth, placing the large plant pots opposite the Royal Oak to help control unauthorised access to the area, and other actions officially recorded by BRAG at this surgery.

BRAG has now formally contacted 3 possible sources of funding to improve the Bryn Village and will continue to progress about half a dozen other sources identified.

BRAG is helping to facilitate the voice of the people of Bryn through public meetings, such as the discussion on the Neath & Port Talbot Local Development Plan, working with Neath & Port Talbot on plans to make the old Bryn tip a protected area for wild life open to the public and many other initiatives.

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BRAG is working with the Police through PACT to make Bryn safer. Current examples are the speed cameras in Bryn, patrols for stray dogs and dog fouling, incidents of vandalism and graffiti, control of off road vehicles and much more. Below is an extract from one of the police reports last month for the Bryn area.

"At the Penybryn barrier (forestry side) we issued a Sect. 59 warning to male on a scrambler. Later we intercepted 5 bikes above the Cwm Wernderi reservoir"

The report continued on to say that even though these riders road off the police continued to track them and seized their bikes.

LETTER FROM HEADTEACHER BRYN PRIMARY SCHOOL Friday Sept. 18th 2009

Some months ago I met with three local residents of Bryn, namely Mr Graham Rowlands, Mrs Julie Moore and Mr Paul Bulmer, who informed me that they were in the process of setting up an action group for the village called BRAG. The purpose of the group is to work within the village of Bryn to try to help improve the village facilities and preserve the culture and heritage of Bryn. I have been invited to join the group as a representative of the school and am very pleased to do so... A school is often seen as the heart of a village and its contribution to the community plays a very important part and I therefore welcome the idea of working with BRAG in the future for the betterment of the village.

As this is a brand new venture one of the initial projects for the group is to create a logo to display on stationery, T-shirts and posters etc. It was decided that we would offer this competition to the children at school to come up with a design for the logo.
