Bacton & Edingthorpe Parish Council Meeting 13 March 2017

The Vattenfall windfarm project is gathering momentum and 7 Parishioners attended the meeting to alert the Council as to the fast progress to date. Vattenfall have been surveying the local area and of main concern to the residents is the relay station which may be located in Edingthorpe. It is alleged that the relay unit will be the size of a football field and approximately 30ft high. At present, there are 3 potential routes, none of which have yet been decided upon. Please ensure that you have your say at the consultation event on Saturday 1st April at Bacton Village Hall between 11am-4pm. A further 8,179 signatures to a petition in support of better sea defences for the area are needed. On 13th January 2017 we had a very

near miss but next time, the sea defences might not hold. We need to get the Government to provide for the future safety of our villages, so please get those fingers clicking and urge everyone you know to sign the petition. The website is www.petition-parliament.uk/petitions/167171 or, alternatively, there is a link to it from the Parish Council's website: <http://bactonandedingthorpe.co.uk/>.

It is hoped that Multisports will commence from Tuesday May 16th until 18th July (a period of 10 weeks). We would again like to reiterate that, unless volunteers come forward soon, this community initiative may not proceed. Volunteers are urgently needed but, without DBS checks being in place in good time, Multisports may not be able to continue in 2017. It is vital that you inform us in advance of your wish to help. We need a minimum of 3 volunteers per session per week, so we are seeking a total of 6-10 people in order that we can

accommodate holidays and illnesses and ensure the workload does not fall on one person's shoulders. Please volunteer now - we need you.

The Council put forward the public's idea for a name for the road leading into the new development to the rear of the Duke. It has been agreed with the relevant authorities that this will be known as Gooch Close.

Members were delighted to award £300 of funding to the Flood Wardens to purchase necessary items to help protect and alert the community.

The next meeting is the Ordinary Parish Council Meeting on 10th April 2017, 7pm Bacton Village Hall Annexe. All are welcome to attend.

We had booked tickets for Matthew Bourne's production of The Red Shoes back in October and been looking forward to it since then as his work is always thrilling. However, it was the evening of Storm Doris and touch and go as to whether we would make it. After many phone calls and rearrangements, four of us made the journey into Norwich without any problem. Thank you, Mavis, for driving. We were rewarded with a good retelling through dance of this well-loved tale. Originally a Hans Christian Andersen story made famous by the Powell/Pressburger film starring Moira Shearer, this was an updated version full of Bourne's creativity but maintaining the surreal, sensuous quality of the film. The dancers performed to the music of Bernard Herrmann taken from his film scores

written between 1935 and 1975. Through the dramatic choreography, the dancers displayed their talent for characterisation and contemporary dance. This was another wonderful performance from Matthew Bourne's New Adventures Production Company.

There was a trip to Cromer Cinema to see the live transmission of the life and paintings of Monet. This was a delightful film showing the artist always striving for a perfect result and initially struggling with poverty. Monet's letters provided this insight. It was a pleasure to see clips of the natural views as well as many of his paintings.

census. His father was a cowkeeper on a farm and Henry was listed as a scholar. In 1911, Henry, his parents William and Emma and only sibling Harold William Allison (born 21st Sept. 1901) were all living at Hall Lane, Knapton, Norfolk, where William was a groom, Emma, a dress maker, Henry an assistant grocer and Harold a scholar. Without service records, it is hard to determine when Henry joined the 6th Battalion East Kent Regiment, but he was sent over to France after 1st January 1916. He was involved in the Arras offensive of 1917 where he was killed in action on 9 April, 1917. He has no known grave but his name is on the Arras memorial and he is commemorated on St Andrew's war memorial. He was awarded the British War medal, Victory medal, Death Penny and Commemorative Scroll, which were sent to his mother as his next of kin.
