MEMBERS' PLANT SALES

WRHS Members may offer home-grown plants for sale at the Trading Post, provided that certain conditions are met. All plants must be potted up in **good quality compost**, in **clean, undamaged pots**, and kept **weed free**. Details of how to label your plants are obtainable from the website, or the Trading Post. Regular watering is carried out by volunteers, but all other maintenance is the responsibility of the vendor. **Please inspect your plants regularly and prevent them getting tatty**. Your cooperation will be greatly appreciated.

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A RECIPE FOR AUGUST

Citrus Courgette Ribbon Salad

Vegetable growers often have a glut of courgettes. This salad is a tasty way to use some of them. Excellent for a barbecue.

Ingredients:

lemon, zest and juice
 tablespoons olive oil
 salad onions, finely chopped
 g walnuts or pine nuts
 courgette, sliced into ribbons using a vegetable peeler
 Salt and freshly ground black pepper
 teaspoon chopped parsley
 Lemon wedges to garnish



Method:

- **1.** In a large bowl, whisk together the lemon zest & juice, oil, onions & nuts.
- 2. Add the courgette ribbons, toss & season with salt & freshly ground black pepper
- 3. Serve sprinkled with parsley and garnished with lemon.

- Time to prune the Wisteria to promote flower growth and control the shape and spread. Tie in strong new shoots horizontally. Cut back all whippy green shoots to 5 or 6 leaves from woody branch.
- Watering is important this month; evening watering avoids leaf burn caused by water drops focussing the sun.
 New plants and plants in tubs need particular care to avoid drying out. "Rain Gel" in the compost makes life easier.
 The Trading Post has water butts, spare taps, automatic rainwater diverters, watering cans, hoses & fittings.
- Sow "green manure" plants to feed the soil where you have lifted crops. See previous page for green manure seeds stocked at the Trading Post, with information on how densely to sow, and when to dig the plants into the soil.
- ▶ Dead head flowering plants regularly. Harvest sweetcorn.
- Pick courgettes regularly, before they turn into marrows. There's a quick and easy courgette recipe on page 2.
- 👽 Summer lettuce, radish, rocket, sorrel, chicory and fennel can still be sown in this part of the country.
- Sow spring cabbage, turnips, oriental vegetables and overwintering onions.
- \mathbf{v} Utilise gaps between winter brassicas for fast growing crops like radishes and cos lettuces.
- Collect any ripe seed you wish to save. Cut out old fruited raspberry canes. Lift and pot up strawberry runners.
- Veep ponds topped up, but avoid using tap water, or at least let it stand in a butt for several days to release chlorine.
- Clear duckweed and blanket weed from ponds, but take great care not to trap small pond creatures, particularly in blanket weed. Baby newts and dragon-fly nymphs are particularly vulnerable.
- 😒 Keep weeding!

MODERNISATION PROGRAMME

The Trading Team are getting to grips with the "Back Office" facilities of the EPOS system, which will streamline the ordering of fresh stock at the right time and in the right quantities. The volunteers who staff the till are becoming familiar with the new technology, and mastering it. Improved and simplified methods of working are being developed.

The installation of Ethernet cabling between till and office is complete. The first of two desktop PCs belonging to the Society, equipped with the latest Linux operating system, has been installed in the office area, and connected to the network. The Trading Team have started to use this computer to access the cloud-based EPOS Back Office systems. This should significantly relieve demand for the Society's laptop machine which is currently its main work-horse. The second desktop PC is being rejuvenated, and will be installed in the office later in the year.
