BEFORE MESSRS. J. E. SHERBON AND E. BONE.—A YOUNG THIEF.—Jane Gibbon, twelve years of age, was charged with having stolen, on the 18th ult., a shawl, valued at 2s. 6d., the property of Edward Massey, 11, Viola-street.—Mrs. Massey said that she gave prisoner some work in her house for a few hours, and after she had left the shawl was missed. She saw nothing more of prisoner or of the shawl until a few days ago, when another girl came to her and told her that the shawl had been pledged at Mr. Simpson's, in Derby-road, and that prisoner had given her the ticket. Prisoner, whose parents were said to have neglected and deserted her, stated that she took the shawl because she was hungry. She was committed to prison for ten days, to be followed by five years' detention in a reformatory.

BIRKENHEAD POLICE COURT.

THURSDAY, JUNE 14.

BEFORE MR. PRESTON.—UNLICENSED MUSIC AND DANCING AT ROCK FERRY.—Mr. McEntgart, licensee of the Royal Bock Hotel, Rock Ferry, was summoned for permitting music and dancing in the gardens attached to the establishment without having a license. Mr. Solly, deputy town-clerk, appeared for the prosecution, and Mr. Moore for the defence.—Inspector Waugh stated that on the 6th instant he visited the gardens, and found from 30 to 40 persons assembled. Three men were playing a fiddle, a harp, and a brass instrument, and about fourteen persons were dancing to the music. The manageress, on being spoken to, stated that she was under the impression that there was a license for music and dancing, and that it was in the possession of Mr. P. Byrne, the proprietor of the hotel, who lived in Liverpool. On being told there was no license, the music and dancing were stopped.—Mr. Moore, for the defence, said there were music and dancing in the gardens all last summer, and the police did not stop it. Mr. Moore added that Mr. McEntgart thought the hotel license included permission for music and dancing in the gardens.—The magistrate remarked that as probably the defendant laboured under a mistake, the justice of the case would be met on the payment of costs. The summons was then withdrawn on payment of costs.
