

Saturday's Post.

[Brought from London by Express.]

From LLOYD'S Evening Post of Friday Night.

This Day arrived a Mail from FRANCE.

Alepe, March 1.

ABOUT four hundred Horsemen, which had been disbanded by the Pacha, being destitute of Employment and Provision, spread themselves over the Country, and committed great Ravages, particularly in one Village about six Leagues from hence, where they massacred the Inhabitants and burnt the Town. They were afterwards joined by 400 more, and had retired into a Town, but a Body of Troops being sent against them, they were defeated in a Sally they had made, and were put to Flight. Sixteen only were taken, who were put to Death on the Spot.

We hear from Bagdat, that Soliman, Pacha of Karacholan, having advanced with twelve thousand Men to within three Days Journey of that City, was defeated by the Pacha of Bagdat with about the same Number, and was obliged to retire to the Mountains, by which Tranquillity is re-established in those Parts.

Paris, May 6. There arrive daily at Brest Vessels filled with French Prisoners from England, where there still remain above 10,000, who are waiting the return of Vessels to bring them hither.

COUNTRY NEWS.

Worcester, May 12. Last Tuesday Morning died, in the 43d Year of his Age, greatly lamented by every Relation and Acquaintance, Mr. Samuel Hill, one of the Aldermen of this Corporation, and who served the respectable Office of Mayor of this City in the Year 1759; of whom it may be justly said, That he was the really honest Man;... the affectionate Husband and Parent;... an ever-ready, sincere Friend;... and the obliging Neighbour.

On the Thanksgiving Day, at a certain Parish Church in this County, where there was a great deal of Ringing, each of the Bells was half muffled, so that the Music they afforded was alternately cheerful and dolorous. The Minister sending to know the Reason of it, the Ringers returned for Answer, That it was to express not only their Joy, on Account of the Peace; but also their great Sorrow and Concern, at the late woeful Tax on Cyder and Perry.

LONDON, MAY 13.

This Morning the Merchants and Traders of this City (at their second Meeting) at the King's Arms Tavern in Cornhill, came to a Resolution to address his Majesty on the definitive Treaty of Peace. A Motion was made by one of the principal Merchants, that notwithstanding the Court was in Mourning, it would be most proper to wait on his Majesty in coloured Cloaths.

In a late Debate upon an intended Address, the Terms proposed were *Honourable and Advantageous*; but upon putting the Question, the Word *Honourable* was agreed to be omitted.

On Wednesday Cutts Maidwell, Esq; paid his Fine into the Chamber of London, to be excused serving the Office of Sheriff.

By some English Sailors which carried over the Comet Frigate to Brest, and which was bought on the French King's Account, we learn, that they have about Twenty Sail of the Line in that Harbour, besides Frigates. There was not yet much Work going on in the King's Yards.

Yesterday Morning, as his Royal Highness Prince William, second Brother to his Majesty, was taking an Airing along the New Road near Paddington, his Horse took Fright at an old Man's Wheel-Barrow laden with Spinnage, which the Horse overset, and likewise beat the Man into a Ditch; his Highness, with the greatest Humanity, immediately dismounted, and made him a Present of seven Guineas.

Last Night, about 11 o'Clock, as the Coachman of his Royal Highness the Duke of York was going to fetch his Highness from Marybone Gardens, he was stopped at the Bottom of Henrietta-Street, Cavendish-Square, by a single Foot Pad, who seized on the Horses Bridle, and ordered him to stop; he then went to the Coach Door, the Glass of which being drawn up, he broke in Pieces with his Pistol, and robbed the Footman, who was in the Coach, of his Watch and 18s. and then went off.

They write from Corke in Ireland, that within a Week past eight Vessels arrived there laden with Wheat and Flour, from different Ports in England.

This Morning, one Collins an Irish Sailor, who broke out of the Gatehouse on Wednesday Evening last, and soon after he had made his Escape, robbed a Woman of six Shillings, was retaken and carried before Sir John Fielding, who committed him to Newgate;

he denaved in the most audacious Manner, and knocked a Man down with his Irons.

Letters from France advise, that the Grand Council of Rouffillon had, in their last Assembly, made a Motion to disannul the Pope's Bull, called, *In Cœna Domini*, by which the Church of Rome announces an Anathema, on every Maundy Thursday, against all Protestants, and all others, that are without the Verge of that Church; alleging, that it affected the Rights and Prerogatives of the Crown, as it cut off from the Bosom of the Church a great Number of the King of France's Servants, Magistrates, and others of his faithful Subjects.

Extract of a Letter from Trois Rivières, or the Three Rivers (in Canada) dated March 15.

“On Saturday the 5th Instant at Ten o'Clock at Night, arrived at his Seat of Government of Three Rivers, his Excellency Brigadier General Burton, to the Great Joy of all the Inhabitants of his Government (many of the Canadian Gentlemen having waited on their Governor) but in particular to the British Merchants, who demonstrated their Satisfaction by illuminating their Houses, drinking the usual Healths on that Occasion, and in a little Time after waited on his Excellency with their Address of Congratulation.

OXFORD, May 14.

On Wednesday last the Reverend Mr. Humphrey Owen, the Bodleian Librarian, and one of the Fellows of Jesus College in this University, was chosen Principal of that Society, in the Room of the Rev. Dr. Parlo, deceased. The Rectory of Rotherfield Pyppard in this County and Diocese is annexed to the Headship of the said College.

A few Days ago died in Leicestershire, the Rev. John Fanshawe, D. D. Canon of Christ Church, and Regius Professor of Divinity in this University. His Eminence in Literature, and the Dignity with which he presided in the Chair, remarkably distinguished him among the Learned; whilst his Affability and Amiability of Deportment rendered him universally respected.

On Wednesday last the Congratulatory Address of the High Sheriff, Nobility, Gentry, Clergy, and Freeholders of Oxfordshire, was presented to his Majesty by Lord De- Spencer, and was most graciously received.

His Majesty has been pleased to appoint Mr. Pye, Son of Henry Pye, Esq; Knight of the Shire for the County of Berks, an Ensign in the first Regiment of Foot-Guards.

On Wednesday Mr. George Tonge of this City, Goldsmith, was married to Miss Madge, eldest Daughter of Mr. Madge, of Chilton near Thame, in this County.

Last Sunday Night Mr. Edmund Tomkins, Master of one of the Racquet Courts in this City, and himself esteemed the best Tennis-Player in England, was unhappily drowned in the Isis, at Ifley Mill; whereby a Widow and several Children are left unprovided for; and whilst his more intimate Acquaintance lament him as a sincere and social Friend, his Loss will be no less regretted by many of the Nobility and Gentry, as a Man of the strictest Integrity. — This melancholy Accident happened thus; seven or eight of them having gone down the Water, on a Party of Pleasure, said late at Ifley, and upon five of them getting into the Wherry to return, just above the Mill, they found the Draught of Water so strong that they must inevitably be carried through one of the Sluices; upon which each thought of Self-preservation, and the first that quitted the Boat was so fortunate as to jump on shore; the next fell about a Yard short, but got out; one was drove down by the Rapidity of the Water, yet happily caught hold of a Post at the Bridge, and crying out for Help, kept his Hold till they forced two Doors of the Mill and came to his Assistance; one fat in the Boat, and was faved; for the Force of the others leaping out turning her Head, she drove down with her Side to the Current, and being jammed across did not go thro': However, upon collecting themselves, Mr. Tomkins was missing, and his Body was not found 'till next Morning, when there was a Contusion on one Side of his Head, which is supposed to have stunned him, as he was a remarkably good Swimmer. —

On Tuesday an Inquest was taken upon him by Mr. Way, one of his Majesty's Coroners for this County.

On Monday an Inquest was taken by the same Gentleman at Kingstone Blount in this County, on the Body of a Child about two Years old who was accidentally drowned in a Well, occasioned by neglecting to put on a proper Cover.

And on Thursday another Inquest was taken by Mr. Way upon the Body of Arthur Eddings, Servant to Farmer Osborne of Yarnton, who was accidentally killed by being run over with a Cart; by which his Brains were crushed out.
