

The general Apprehension of a War breaking out on the Continent, is in no Degree abated, but rather increased. Our Ministers do not expect to hear that the Emperor will recede from his Claims. The foreign Ministers at our Court entertain the same Opinion. Whatever Speculations Politicians may amuse themselves with, War seems to be the Ultimatum.

In Case of a War upon the Continent, many People imagine we shall remain perfectly neutral. Such a Situation is no Doubt very desirable; but it is not attainable. Hanover borders upon the expected Theatre of War; and it is one of the Imperial Electorates. It may be looked upon next to a Certainty, that our Connection with Hanover will involve us, either immediately or eventually, in the War.

The King of Prussia seems at present to be in the Situation of the sick Lion in the Fable, who was inflamed by Beasts of inferior Strength and inferior Cunning. The other Powers of the North have taken Advantage of his Infirmitates, and may probably one Day divide his Dominions too, if his Successor should not possess a superior Proportion of intellectual Power.

Yesterday Morning some Dispatches were received from Virginia, which were brought over in the Thompson, Captain Bell, arrived at Bristol. They contain an Account of Trade being as brisk there as ever, and that several Ships were lading with Tobacco for London and France, and many People had arrived from England to settle there.

Wednesday, and not before, Thomas Orde, Esq. set off for Ireland.

Brigadier-General Nelson, who is now at Bombay, was yesterday confirmed by the Court of Directors of the East India Company, in his Station of Commander in Chief at that Presidency. The other Candidates were Colonels Braitwaite and Keating, and Lieutenant-Colonel Haitrey.

On Tuesday last came on the Election of two Members for the Town and Port of Seaford, in Suffex, when Sir Peter Parker and Sir John Henderfon, Barts. were returned as duly elected.

A Company of the Artillery at Woolwich is ordered to prepare to embark for Gibraltar to relieve the Corps coming home from thence.

From Rochefort we hear, that on the 20th of March they launched a Man of War of 60 Guns; they have two more on the Stocks, one of 80, and another of 74; and in their Wet Dock they have two Frigates nearly finished.

Wimbolden Houfe, the Seat of the Right Hon. Lord Spencer, which was lately burnt, was built by Sarah Duchess of Marlborough, and cost Twenty-eight Thousand Pounds, besides the Furniture, Library, &c. all of which were very valuable.

Commissions are received for buying up 1000 large Saddle Horses for the Service of the Dutch, who are going to revive the Regiment of Cuirassiers, which rendered themselves so famous in the Years 1708 and 1709, during Queen Anne's Wars, at which Time they consisted of 1300 Men; at present they do not, Officers included, amount to more than Three score: So much have the States permitted their oldest and most fervent Corps to go to Decay.

On Tuesday Morning last the Council closed their Cafe and the Evidence upon the Petition for the Borough of Cricklade; and Yesterday Morning the Committee read their Resolutions to the Parties and their Council, which in Substance were as follow:

That Robert Adamfon, and Charles Wortley Cox, Esqrs. were not duly elected Burgesses for the Borough of Cricklade.

That Robert Nicholas, and John Walker Henegge, Esq. were duly elected Burgesses for the Borough of Cricklade, and should have been returned.

They also resolved, That it was the Opinion of the Committee, that the Conduct of the Returning Officer in taking the Poll, and in making the Return, at the late Election of Members to serve in Parliament for the Borough of Cricklade, in the County of Wilts, was partial and illegal; whereby a colourable Majority was obtained upon the Poll for Mr. Adamfon and Mr. Cox.

And it was ordered by the Committee, That the Chairman do report the above Resolution to the House.

This is the second flagrant Instance of this Conduct in a Returning Officer in this Parliament!—Surely some Remedy should be applied to an Evil, which is attended with such heavy and serious Consequences, to the Parties, and to the Public!

The Majority upon the Return for Mr. Adamfon and Mr. Cox, was 80; as upon an accurate State of the Poll at the Close of the Petitioner's Cafe, on Tuesday, the Council stated the Majority to be in Favour of the Petitioners, 60 at the lowest.—So that the Difference between the real and fictitious Poll was 140 Votes.

Last Sunday Morning, a young Lady of great Family, at the West End of the Town, jumped out of a One-pair-of-Hairs Window, in a high Kicker—into the Arms of her Lover!—They immediately set off for Worcestershire, but were pursued and overtaken in Oxfordshire, where the Gentleman made his Escape; but the Lady was safely conducted back to her Friends.

Yesterday Morning, about Three o'Clock, John Lucas and John Waters, two of the Convicts under Sentence of Death in Newgate, made an Attempt to escape, and had succeeded so far as to make a Hole in the Floor of their Cell (thick Oak) which was on the Ground Floor, through which they scraped and removed the Earth till they came to the Arch-Work of the Common-Sewer which runs under their Cell and Part of Newgate; this they also perforated, and dropped into the Sewer, which took them breath high and more. Here they wandered about some Time; but missing their Way, came to the Gulley-Hole opposite the Pelons Gate, where the Watch hearing them, alarmed the Keepers, who with Ropes, &c. with Difficulty got them out. They were so benumbed with Cold that they could not stand, and must have perished had they not been discovered.

Anecdote.—When the late Lord Clancarty was Captain of a Man of War, in 1724, and was cruising off the Coast of Guinea, his Lieutenant (a Scotch Presbyterian) came hastily into the Cabin, and told his Lordship that the Chaplain was dead; and what was worse, he died a Roman Catholic. Lord Clancarty replied, he was very glad of it.—“Hoot! ye! My Lord (said the Officer) what are ye glad that yer Chaplain died a Papist?” “Yes, (answered his Lordship) for he is the first Sea Parson I ever knew that had any Religion at all.”

They write from Brest, that the 74 Gun Ship which is designed for the East Indies, is intended to supply the Place of that which was lately lost there, and not sent with any View to keep up an extraordinary Force in that Quarter.

They write from L'Orient, that the Warehouses there are filled with India Goods, which are sold at a very low Rate.

The King's Cutters keep so good a Look-out on the Hampshire Coast, that a Smuggler dare not show his Face there. They used to swarm on that Coast.

The Greenland Fishery, during the present Year, will employ more than six Thousand Seamen. The Number of English Ships on those Seas will amount to upwards of one Hundred and twenty Sail.

COUNTRY NEWS.

Worcester, March 21. At a numerous and respectable Meeting of the Inhabitants of this City, convened at our Guildhall on Tuesday last, it was unanimously agreed to petition Parliament against erecting Locks, &c. on the River Severn; it was also resolved to apply for a Mail Conveyance to this City, on Mr. Palmer's Plan, similar to those now used at Bath, Bristol, &c.

Last Week a free Pardon came to our City God for Margaret Pugh, condemned at Lent Affizes, 1783.

At the Affizes for the County of Warwick, John Chaburn, Elizabeth Green, Samuel Packwood, Sam. Smith, John Steigh, John Shardlow, Joseph Hyde, Thomas Timmins, Richard Stevens, John Ridge, Thomas Jones, James Gorden, Martin Stone, Charles Repair, Thomas Summerland, and John Brindley, were condemned.—The first seven are left for Execution.—Packwood is a Native of this City.

Oxford, April 2.

From the best Authority we can assure our Readers, that there will be three grand Musical Performances in the Theatre in June next, at the Time of commemorating the Founders and Benefactors to this University; of which the Particulars will be given in a future Paper.

A Course of Lectures in Experimental Philosophy will begin at the Museum on Monday the 11th Instant, at Half an Hour after Twelve o'Clock.

On Monday last died, in the 97th Year of his Age, the Reverend Dr. Bray, Rector of Exeter College, Canon of Windsor, and Rector of Bix in this County. The Living of Bix is in the Gift of the Earl of Macclesfield.

On Thursday last the Reverend Mr. Hele, B. D. Fellow of Trinity College, was presented by that Society to the Rectory of Rotherfield Grays, in this County.

Yesterday George Cooke, A. B. of Oriol College, was elected Fellow of that Society.

On Wednesday last Mr. Stephen Townsend, an eminent Builder of this City, was married to Miss Ann Batten, only Daughter of Mr. John Batten, of this Place; a most amiable young Lady, with a very genteel Fortune.

On Saturday March 26 died, at Cropredy, in this County, the Reverend John Hopkins, B. D. aged Sixty-nine, formerly Fellow of Pembroke College. He had been Vicar of that extensive Parish above twenty-six Years, but was prevented by his Infirmitates from doing the Duties of it for a considerable Time before his Death. He was an orthodox Divine, a sound Scholar, and an honest Man. The Living is in the Gift of the Bishop of Oxford.

Last Saturday Morning died, of a paralytic Stroke, Mr. John Carman, Printer of the Reading Mercury.

Thursday Evening John Garland, a Lad about fifteen Years of Age, was unhappily thrown from a Horse, on which he was riding behind a Gentleman's Servant, on the Kidlington Road, about Half a Mile from this City; by which Accident he received a violent Concussion of the Brain, and was otherwise so much bruised, that he languished till six o'Clock Yesterday Morning, and then expired.

On Friday last John Prince, late Bridewell Keeper at Abingdon, who had been missing ever since the 2d of February last, was found drowned in the River Isis, in the Parish of Culham. The same Day an Inquisition was taken on the Body, before Mr. Johnson, of Benon, Coroner for this County; and a Report having prevailed that his Life had been threatened by some evil-disposed Persons who had been his Prisoners in the said Bridewell, it was judged necessary to call in a Surgeon; and a thorough Investigation took Place, which occasioned many Hours Deliberation, when the Head was found swelled and discoloured on the Right Side, as if some Violence had been used; and on removing the Scalp, he found the Cellular Membrane under the Tamefaction contained a fluid like coagulated Blood, but without any Fracture; and no Evidence being produced corresponding with the Report of Throats having been made Use of, the Jury returned their Verdict, “*Accidentally Drowned.*”
