The general Apprehension of a War breaking out on the Continent, is in no Degree abated, but rather encreased. Our Ministers do not expect to hear that the Emperor will recede from his Claims. The foreign Ministers at our Court entertain the same Opinion. Whatever Speculations Politicians may amuse themselves with, War seems to be the Ultimatum. In Case of a War upon the Continent, many People imagine we shall remain perfectly neutral. Such a Situation is no Doubt very defirable; but it is not attainable. Hanover borders upon the expected Theatre of War; and it is one of the Imperial Electorates. It may be looked upon next to a Certainty, that our Connexion with Hanover will involve us, either immediately or eventually, in the War.
