TOWN HALL, Friday.—Is GAS-LIME MANURE?—

THE INTAKE ROAD AGAIN.—*Martin Wheatcroft*, tollkeeper at the Intake bar, was summoned by Thos. Lee, farmer, Mosbro' Moor hall, for having on the 28th August demanded a toll for two horses and a cart laden with gas lime going through the bar. Mr. Chambers, who appeared for the complainant, said that he refused to pay the toll when it was demanded on the ground that it was manure. By the local act lime carried for the purpose of manure was exempt from toll if conveyed in a cart of prescribed dimensions. But by the general turnpike act, all manure was exempt from toll, and therefore the claim made upon the complainant was illegal. . . . Mr. Pierson, (Wilson, Younge and Pierson,) who appeared for the defendant, contended that this case came within the exception of the private act, inasmuch as the complainant had not carried the lime in a cart of the prescribed size, for he urged that it was not manure but lime. . . . The Bench held that it was not lime but artificial manure, and therefore it did not come within the exception of the local act; it was accordingly exempt without regard to the dimensions of the cart. . . . The defendant was ordered to pay 1s. and costs.
