The New Lighting System at the Village Hall After a lot of work over the last two years, thinking, discussing, and deciding, the Village Hall now has a brand-new, modern, efficient and flexible lighting system!

The lighting that was installed when the hall was built in the 1990s was of a very high standard, a proud legacy of what the founders of the hall project achieved for us. In fact it was equipped from the very start as a compact theatre, and the equipment we have inherited was very good indeed. Many theatrical, musical, and event productions benefited from what the "Founding Fathers" (and Mothers!) of the Village Hall bequeathed to us.

Over twenty years later, the opportunity arose to improve even further upon that, using the most modern equipment and techniques available. To cut a long story short, the village hall can now offer a highly capable and flexible lighting system based on the modern standards - the "DMX 512 Protocol", for the enthusiasts. What does this mean in practice?

Well, it is immediately apparent upon entrance that there is a ring of lamps right around the circumference of the Hall. Sixteen of them, in fact, including those above the stage. These are "DMX LED ParCan" lamps, each one of which can shine out in almost any colour you can imagine - from deep red, through white, to Ultra-Violet (UV). And each one can shine different colours and brightnesses, if required. The original, theatre-standard "incandescent" lamps have also been retained, and a new digital controller added just for them. This allows us to use them in a more flexible and controllable way.

We also have six new "Moving Head" lamps of different types, that can throw light in patterns and colours all around the space.

Since the system was installed last Summer, we have hosted a big Wedding reception; an ambitious Dramatic production; a Flower show; a Halloween Special; two Harrowbarrow School concerts; and a special Birthday party. Each one was lit differently, and gave an ambience to the Hall that the overhead Fluorescent lighting could never do. "Transformed" is the phrase that has been repeatedly used.

AND HERE IS THE IMPORTANT PART: the new lighting was designed to be used by everyone! With a little notice, a lighting setup can be arranged which can be stored onto a single button on a simple panel by the side of the stage. Let the Hall Management know, and lighting can be tailored to your event and on the day. You just turn up and press the button! Remember, it's not just a stage system - it can be used throughout the Hall!

So, please, take advantage of the hard work done by the Project Management team; make use of the most advanced and user-friendly community hall lighting system in Cornwall! You know it's a BRIGHT idea... Simon and Linda-Beth.



Huge Congratulations to SHAME The last weekend in February saw the Biennial Panto production Aladdin. Directed by Mal Rowe this was by far the most ambitious production we have undertaken. choreographers, director and his able assistant, stage crew, tea makers, door and ticket sorters, not forgetting Simon and Linda Beth who gave the new hall lighting system its first real workout. What a huge improvement with so much versatility available to utilise..... And, talking utilising the

Allotment Update by Carol Watson



Dear Readers,

It is a while since our last allotment update, so you will be heartened to hear we are still going strong! This spring we have a Duke of Edinburgh volunteer who is proving willing and strong...a very important addition to us oldies! Hopefully we can inspire him as much as he inspires us, with his enthusiasm and willingness, to continue growing fruit and veg.

This year we are expanding our fruit section with white currants. We have also taken cuttings from our two red currant bushes.....a great favourite with the children and plan to prune our established and prolific black currants as we harvest this year. The deer tend to prune the gooseberries so we just have to remember to cover them!

We have also extended our strawberry season with some donated exotic sounding 'French' varieties. Hope to pick from June to October....watch this space! We are also planting runners from our established mid season 'English' variety......just to keep the Brexit debate going!!

Reading some recent articles on vegan gardening, I have come to realise we meet the criteria for vegan growing. By growing nitrogen fixing crops, allowing crops to rot down and fertilise the soil and using wood ash, we add no chemical or animal fertilisers to our site. Also by rotating our growing sites we allow the soil to lie fallow and hopefully regenerate. This system has been in place for the last three years and last year we were virtually no dig....we did agree to dig a carrot/parsnip row, no weed.....again the carrot/ parsnip row! and no watering....even with last summer's wonderful heat and lack of rain!

Our veg were amazing last year, giving us all the ingredients for coleslaw... all summer. Across the season, broccoli, Brussel sprouts, spring, autumn and winter cabbage, new and salad potatoes, beetroot, chard, broad, runner and French beans, sweet corn and more.....the list is as long as our growers "like to eat" list! All this, as well as prize-winning fruit and veg at Harrowbarrow and Callington shows, for an hour a month and £35 a year!

Birds Report

Already three months into 2019 and the weather patterns we have experienced in February have been phenomenal: so much so that there have been reports seen of Tawny Owl chicks outside their nest which is unheard of in the UK - and they are not the only species which have started early.

I have heard of a company trying to drive the regular chimney sweeps in the village out of business. There have been reports during my time of writing for Hamlet of Jackdaws getting stuck down chimneys and causing quite a stir, with professional help summoned, as well as the RSPB to try and coax the bird out of the said chimney or room. When all ended well, with the bird returned to the wild and the house owner happy that the chimney was swept, the sweep had not cleaned up properly - so beware of these rogue traders! I have had a mixed start to the year and was restricted to barracks for a couple of weeks with my feet up. I sat in a comfy chair strategically placed with a good view of the garden, binoculars close to hand and a good book. I then set about watching what went on in the garden during the time we are normally at work. The highlight was spotting female Black Caps feeding on the remains of the crab apples in the garden, also a Grey Wagtail which I only see once in a blue moon.



Apart from the normal visitors to the garden, plus a badger and fox, I think I should mention the ones I have **not** seen during the winter period in a while, which is a bit worrying, Yellow Hammer, Siskin, House Sparrow, Brambling. Let's hope this is only a blip. In the next few months listen for sounds of the Cuckoo, and look out for Swallows, Swifts and House Martins which always brighten up my day - hopefully yours

Although obviously highly unusual, this event highlights the danger posed to pedestrians by vehicles being driven at speed through our narrow roads where, frequently, there is not room for even two cars to pass each other.

For pedestrians, the advice about wearing high-visibility clothing might also include a suggestion that on hearing an approaching vehicle one should :-

STOP AND GET AS CLOSE TO THE HEDGE AS POSSIBLE UNTIL THE VEHICLE HAS PASSED.

Walking is so good for us and enjoyable but we need to be careful.

Spring is nothing if not unpredictable, with heady days of warm sunshine bringing us all out to enjoy our flowering countryside before heading back inside when the storms arrive, chasing us with rain, hail and strong winds! How quickly dry, dusty paths can turn muddy and slippery and we appreciate our walking boots and poles to aid balance.

We recently calculated that there are just over 14 miles of Public Rights of Way in Calstock parish, volunteers from CFS monitor these on behalf of the Parish Council. Whereas our Walk Guides offer over 40 miles of circular walks! Why the difference? It's all those connecting lanes, quiet roads and permissive paths that link together the actual bits of legally-allowed public access. A recent bid by Cornwall Council's Countryside Access Team to get extra funding to deal with a 10-year plus backlog of public right of way queries failed, which is of concern. Visitors and residents alike love walking in Cornwall's peace and beauty, and long may this continue.

Locally, we await the full planning application for the renewed flood protection at Calstock with interest. The steering group (Environment Agency, Dorothy Kirk - Cornwall Councillor, Alastair Tinto - Parish Councillor, Tamar Community Trust, Calstock Footpath Society, Cornwall Wildlife Trust, Tamar Valley AONB) are working together to see how we can enable the future of the popular permissive path alongside the River Tamar as part of much-needed flood protection. When the plans have been published, they will be available to see at Calstock Village Hall.

In April, May and June we head into our neighbouring parishes to experience upper and lower reaches of the Walkham Valley and ancient woodlands on the outskirts of our ocean city of Plymouth. More details on our website or contact me. You are very welcome to join us.
