There have been a number of unexpected and necessary extras, like the increased depth of footings that building control has insisted on, which means the funds held have been spent and the Parish Council are waiting for the SSDC grant of £12,500 in order to complete the project. The Parish Council needed to provide additional information to support the grant application by the end of October. To date (Nov 5th) a response is still awaited.

The County Councilor has indicated that he will be selecting the Merriott dropped kerb project as one of the two priorities for the highways small improvement scheme 2014/15.

The Parish Council wish to thank the volunteers who have kept the Broadway Garden in good shape this last year.

Hinckley Point C update



Following Sam Wycherley's article on the "Hinckley Point C" Debate in the October issue of the Merriott Messenger, we thought you might be interested to read this statement from Christopher le Hardy:

Massive Boost for Somerset's economy -Hinkley Point

"SCC, the Government and energy provider EDF have reached commercial agreement on the key terms of a proposed investment contract that brings the prospect of a new nuclear reactor at Hinkley Point a big step closer.

This is a huge step forward on what has been a very long road towards the development of Hinkley Point C. Somerset is at the forefront of the UK's new generation of nuclear development and the proposed Hinkley Point C nuclear power station is an extremely important opportunity for our County. The proposed development could eventually generate 7% of the nation's energy needs over the next 60 years, as well as provide major benefits for Somerset, including:

25,000 jobs created over the construction period; 5,600 construction jobs plus 1000's of supply chain jobs; £128m is to be made available for community benefit projects over 40 years, once the plan is operational; investment in housing, education and transport; £100m per year will put into the regional economy during peak construction; £40 million per year will go into the regional economy, reaching more than £2bn over the lifetime of the project; 900 permanent workers will be required when Hinkley Point C is operational and 400 new apprenticeships will be created."

The morning mist was slow to clear and the hot weather seemed to be about to change. I'm surrounded by trees towering above me reaching for the clouds. The sun is peeping

I only have a mother, no brothers or sisters but most of all I don't have a father. That's why I am here in this forest right now; searching for the other half of me. Mother would not divulge any answers, only that he was dead; I won't believe that though, I can't. Seven days before, I discovered that this forest, this particular part was where my father was last seen alive. With barely a handful of friends at school, finding and locating a mere trace of my father means the entire world to me. All I have is one photo that proves I had a father. I keep it in a silver locket the falls directly on my heart.

The sun has vanished, the weather has taken a sorrowful turn as dark rain clouds have obtained residency of the sky. Rain begins falling, a slight drizzle but still enough to sprinkle the leaves like a gardeners hose. Tear drops of rain glide down my rosy cheek, tickling me before diving to the forest floor. My cooper red hair has transformed back into its natural state; wild and curly. In amongst the pitter-patter of raindrops I hear a twig snap. I dart my head in every direction searching for the source. The hairs on the back of my neck stand up like soldiers sensing danger. I crouch under the nearest oak tree, hugging my knees tightly to my chest. Adrenaline surges through my veins. The birds chirp blissfully above me, I've always admired their audacity to continue their song when many of us struggle with the prospect of reality. Something catches my eye, etched into the oak tree is a message directed to me, it reads 'Dearest Rosalie, I knew you'd find this. Walk 25 metres ahead and dive down the hole. Love Charlie (Father).' Thoughts racing through my mind I break into a run; grinning from ear to ear thinking about finding my father.

Moped Loan Scheme



By the very nature of the work they do with young people in rural areas, transport has always been a significant problem for the Somerset Rural Youth Project. Public transport is often very limited and in many cases non-existent, young people often cannot afford their own and may rely on parents or friends, or may simply miss out on the opportunity for work, training or socialising with their peers.

Somerset Rural Youth Project's innovative **Moped Loan Scheme** supplies them with an economical moped at reasonable cost, while supporting the young person and helping them towards organising their own transport. In most years, demand has often exceeded supply. As from October 2010, reinforced by its new fleet of 18 machines, SRYP can help more young people towards independence.

For young people, certain conditions apply for eligibility; to find out if they can help you and if you live in a rural area in Somerset, telephone the Moped Loan Scheme office, 01278 722100 and speak to one of their staff. You may want to find out how the scheme works and what you need to do and you can download and read or print out information from their website: www.sryp.org.uk, or email: mopeds@sryp.org.uk.

Before you apply, you also need to have applied and have been issued with a provisional driving licence. If you have not already done so, you can apply on-line: <u>www.gov.uk/</u> <u>apply-first-provisional-driving-licence</u>



Living in Bower Hinton meant that 17 year old Jack Forrester was looking at a future on benefits. "There are so many young people looking for jobs" he said "and with no way of getting to work or college I was stuck. I left school in 2010 and have only had temporary jobs since then, now I have a real career in front of me".

Jack was fortunate to be one of those to be loaned a moped, who now have an additional 5 bikes available thanks to intervention from the Yarlington Housing Group.

Funding of £28,000 in 2012 from the housing association enabled the Youth Project to supply the extra mopeds to young people to help them get into work or training, and within days of hearing the good news, Jack secured himself a place as an apprentice mason.

Cycling in South Somerset



Cycle way in Catalonia

Over the half term, I had a cycling holiday in Catalonia, Spain. While the experience was very enjoyable, it struck me as such a contrast to South Somerset, where cycling is not so popular an activity. In Catalonia (more specifically, Banyoles and La Garrotxa), there is a culture of cycling and it is something both widely practiced and provided for. Cycling takes many forms, from mountain biking to getting from A to B and cycle paths and mountain bike tracks are in good provision. by Sam Wycherley

While there are some cycle routes – there is one going through Merriott, in fact – they mainly fall on roads, which is not ideal. Many of the small lanes on which the cycle paths lie are busy and narrow, making them ill-suited for cyclists. This presents a problem of personal safety for the cyclist and makes the existing cycle routes in our area impractical.

I feel that cycling is something to be encouraged. Not only is it low cost, and helps reduce carbon emissions, but it also encourages exercise – something becoming increasingly important in modern day life. However, I also see a need for a more coordinated and safe network of cycle routes near Merriott – perhaps incorporating some of the walking trails, e.g. the Parrett Trail. Through such a scheme, we can also widen the range of cycling routes (there are relatively few), and so further encourage cycling as a sport and means of transport.



Book Review by Sheila Bowman

The Great Gatsby by F. Scott Fitzgerald

One benefit of belonging to a book group is that you are sometimes led to revisit old favourites and this was recently the case when our group read The Great Gatsby. It's one of those books that people often read in their teens as a recommended classic, or maybe have seen a film version. However, it is a



delight to rediscover the quality and insight of F. Scott Fitzgerald's writing.

The book is written through the eyes of Nick Carraway, himself a member of an American "old" established family, who is taking a holiday at West Egg on the coast near New York. His neighbour is the enigmatic Jay Gatsby, very rich and host to lavish weekend parties attended by socialites, intent on the trivial pleasures of the 1920s. The source of Gatsby's wealth is suspect and he is clearly regarded as "nouveau riche".

Many years before he had fallen for Daisy, a girl of "good" family who had loved him in return, but his lack of money and background made him an unsuitable match. Gatsby had gone off to fight in the First World War and then studied at Oxford. Daisy however did not wait for him to return having made his fortune, but married Tom Buchanan her social equal but. we gather, rather a bore and an unfaithful one at that. The novel brilliantly evokes the hectic pleasure seeking social whirl of this level of society and follows the rekindling of Daisy and Gatsby's love to its tragic conclusion. Fitzgerald's writing is extraordinary. It is spare and elegant. Describing Gatsby's party that Nick attends, he writes "In his blue gardens, men and girls went like moths among the whispering and the champagne and the stars." The book is short - only 180 pages but he manages to draw the reader in to depths of insight into the character, both of people and the society they inhabit. The recent film with Leonardo Di Caprio had such bad critical assessment that I haven't seen it. Sometimes when reading the book I found it difficult not to have the images of the Robert Redford /Mia Farrow version in my head. But the book - as is so often the case - really does it better!

Merriott Village Plan 2014 - have your say

Following the questionnaire of 2012, preparations are underway for the production of an updated Merriott Village Plan in 2014. This is an important document because it shows to the District and County Councils, as well as to the Health Authorities and other organisations, what services and facilities the residents wish to have in the years ahead. In the absence of a Village Plan, the planning authorities can assume the village community is not interested in the extent and location of new development.

In particular, a Plan sets out the sort of housing and business development which the people who live here want or don't want. It is fine for a village to grow but new housing has to be accompanied by additional facilities such as a bigger school and recreation facilities.

Merriott has grown very little since the last Plan in 2007. However, there are already planning approvals for over 80 new houses and there are several sites which could accommodate perhaps 200 or 300 new properties – both housing and business properties. Some of these may be welcome if they are in the right place and of the appropriate size and cost.
