School Visit to the Jurassic Coast

The topic at Merriott this half term is Landscapes and Coastlines.

Key Stage One visited Charmouth in May to search for fossils on the beach. The day was led by staff at the Heritage Centre who showed the children a video about the Jurassic coast and how it was formed. Before going out to the beach to look for fossils themselves, the children were shown examples of belemnites and ammonites so that they would know what to look for. Plenty of fossils were found by children, staff and helpers.

During their seaside visit, Key Stage Two, led by Heritage Centre staff, measured the fall of the beach and noted the size of the pebbles at each measurement.

Sandcastles were built to simulate the cliffs and sea water was poured over them gently and then vigorously to show the effects of sea erosion. The children enjoyed being a 'wave', using actions as they ran up the beach.

Information from South Somerset District website:

Smoke from a bonfire causes a nuisance to others, we can serve an Abatement Notice requiring the nuisance to stop. Breach of this Abatement Notice is an offence.

There are no local byelaws

about bonfires. Our advice is that you should have bonfires only occasionally and at times and in weather conditions when smoke is unlikely to cause nuisance to your neighbours. If you are going to have a bonfire, follow these simple rules:

Plant Hunters' Fair a success

The Plant Hunters' Fair at Lower Severalls is an annual event, held in aid of the plants and gardens charity, Plant Heritage (formerly NCCPG).

The event took place last month, and the weather could not have been more fitting. 25 specialist growers and nurseries from all over the South West attended, such as Roseland House Nursery from Truro, specialising in climbers such as Clematis, and Hidden Valley Nursery from Umberleigh, Devon. More local nurseries included the Margery Fish Nursery from East Lambrook.

The growers are passionate about their plants, and freely offer advice on how to grow them – one of the benefits of buying from specialist

local nurseries rather than the larger garden centres. For example, Useful Plants based at Lower Severalls Nursery, made its debut, specialising in herbs and vegetables, and we were all very excited to see a particularly unusual vegetable on the Plant Heritage stall, a tuber, Oxalis Tuberosa, commonly called "Oca", which is not dissimilar to potatoes, but with no risk of disease or blight.

Refreshments such as bacon and pork baps, homemade cakes, and soup were available throughout the day, and there was even a good trade for lavender and agave nectar fudge.

The event raised well over £1000 for Plant Heritage, which specialises in preserving garden plants, and is the world's leading plant conservation charity. The stallholders also did well, and the range of nurseries left the fair-goers with plenty of choice.

We look forward to the event being held around the next time next year, and hope it will be just as successful as this year.

Messenger Book Review by Janet Lailey

Emma JANE AUSTEN

'Emma' by Jane Austen pub: 1816

This year is the bi-centenary of 'Pride and Prejudice', as we have been frequently reminded, but I thought I would re-read 'Emma' to work out why I don't like it as much as Jane Austen's other novels.

As in her other books, it is the bumpy course of true love which drives the narrative. Emma considers herself an intuitive match-maker, with painful—and to her readers - very amusing, results, if not for her acquaintances nor herself. Her gradual awakening to self-knowledge develops through humiliating mistakes, but her inherent kindness brings about the happy ending we all want for her.

So far, so good. There is a cast of brilliantly drawn characters, whose personalities are vividly shown in the dialogue; hardly any description is given, but each reader, I am sure, quickly gets an image of Mrs. Elton and her snobbish vulgarity, of Miss Bates whose breathless monologues run a fine line between funny and tedious; Mr Knightly whose severe common sense challenges Emma's wayward attempts to shape others' lives; the sociable Mr Weston; Harriet, Emma's sweet and biddable companion, who can't make up her

mind what coloured ribbon goes with yellow muslin, let alone who she is in love with. A whole ensemble who play out their intertwined lives in the village of Highbury, sixteen miles from London.

Much of the humour derives from the central figure of Mr Woodhouse, Emma's father, long a widower, a lifelong hypochondriac, who refers always to Emma's former governess as 'poor Mrs Weston' because she has had the misfortune to be (very happily) married, when she could have stayed on in their household, and is now at the considerable distance of a mile away. The respect and consideration which each friend pays to Mr Woodhouse is a measure of their moral worth (Mrs Elton fails this test). Emma is a devoted, attentive daughter, who has managed the house since her mother's death, and whose main object is to maintain her father's comfort, physical and mental. This is where I find myself impatient; I can't enjoy the comedy of Mr Woodhouse. I find him exasperating. I want Emma to find him exasperating, but Jane Austen is very firm about the deference due to all parents, even the neglectful or self-centred, and by this criterion Emma is exactly as she should be.

There is a sense of claustrophobia, for me anyway, about the Highbury community, but this must, in fact, be an accurate picture of village life 200 years ago. Gossip spreads like wildfire, a journey to London is an extreme event. People are rigidly kept to their social status, and young ladies do not walk anywhere unaccompanied. There is a saving wit in Jane Austen's observation of the vagaries of the world she has chosen to portray, and much of social history to be gleaned: just how different is village life today?

To many this is her best book; to me a rereading has brought fresh interest, and if not thinking it her best, I still find it hugely entertaining, and deeper than it seems at first.

News from All Saints Church

The village of Merriott is blessed to have such an ancient and beautiful The churchyard church. too is wonderful, and has been exceptionally pretty this spring with abundant daffodils, celandines, primroses and speedwells just flower name varieties.

There are many here who would never come to a Sunday service but would say they valued Merriott church. For some I imagine, it is a sign of solidity, history tradition. For others it represents a real sense of continuity, as they recall the church marking life's events for them and their families - from baptism through marriage to saying farewell at the end of our time here on earth. For others yet, there might be a sense that village is complete

without its pretty church and elegant burial ground it is part of what living in a village is all about.

But we have come to learn something else about Merriott Church. Lots of people tell us how friendly and welcoming it is. That in itself is not a surprise, but what is interesting is that people often mean that the church is friendly and welcoming even when it is empty of people!

Our church seems to have its own voice and speaks about itself without the need for any human mediator. It seems to impart a feeling and a story to those who come to spend time there. How exactly does an apparently inert building do this? Why do we sense an atmosphere on entering a church like All Saints? I am not sure I can explain, but I can't help

feeling that it must relate to the peace and quiet that lies within.

Along with this physical quiet (the kind you can measure scientifically) there is definitely a stillness. The building wants you to be calm and to be attentive to what it might have to say to you - what god might have to say to you. It also feels safe. Youngsters who come always uninhibited! When I am in All Saints, I have a strong sense that it is a living church - not just an ancient building - even long after its people have gone home.

A priest friend of mine explained the similar atmosphere of his church by saying that 'the walls were soaked in hundreds of years of prayer'. Perhaps that is it, but I would really like to hear about how All Saints Church makes **you** feel – and why. Rev Bob Hicks.
