




The Big Issues

- There is a concern that, over the past couple of decades, the "Dalry Community" may have suffered from a lack of co-ordinated community involvement in many aspects of our community life and the upkeep of our community assets and facilities
- A desire to make Dalry a better place to live in
- Do we need to establish a Community Development Hub for the Parish of Dalry?
- Should this proposed Hub identify potential sources of community funding, and determine how it can access and manage such funds for the betterment of Dalry?

How do we go about establishing a Community Development Hub?

- Engagement with the community
- Engagement with other Dalry groups
- Engagement with NAC

Why establish a Community Hub?

- The Dalry Community Action Plan (Ayrshire 21)
 highlights the fact that Dalry has failed to access various
 funding sources, due to lack of a strong cohesive voice
 lobbying on the community's behalf.
- Other well organised local communities hosting windfarms and other renewable developments have got together and secured large amounts of funding from the developers, and have also been instrumental in identifying and applying for funds/grants from their local authority, charities and other benefactors.
- The greatest community gains have usually been achieved where the wind farm community benefits and other funding sources are secured, managed and distributed by a locally elected body.

Why establish a Community Hub?

- The only way Dalry is going to reap the maximum benefit from the many available funding sources is by the community working together. The proposal is to form a 'hub' to present a strong voice for the community.
- In order for the 'hub' to be strong, effective and be 'the voice' for Dalry, all the organisations who work hard in their own areas, need to support this effort to enable change and improvement for Dalry.
- Please note that the purpose of this group ("Hub") is not to duplicate or interfere with any activities currently undertaken by other established Dalry Community organisations, rather to act as the focal point for accessing funds and enabling joint working towards mutual goals.

Stage 2

- Healthy Dalry Project
- Day time and evening classes for residents
- More support for job seekers in Dalry
- Practical support for the development of civic events in Dalry
- Full size indoor bowling
- Outreach/drop-in project for young people

Stage 3 Undertake a Gap analyses

- What issues are being addressed and funded by other Dalry groups?
- What issues are not being addressed?
- Prioritise those issues that need to be addressed.
- What funding could be available to address the prioritised list?

- Establish a Community Development Hub for the Parish of Dalry
- Brighten up Dalry Town Centre
- Resolve current issues regarding ownership, and the ongoing repair and maintenance of the Lynn Glen walk and other walks in Dalry
- Meet with Community Wind Power Ltd and attempt to resolve the current impasse regarding Millour Hill community benefits and the perceived limitations imposed by the current method of managing and allocating the community benefits derived from the Dalry Community Wind Farm (Wardlaw Wood).
- Brighten up Dalry Railway Station plants?
- Lobby NAC to ensure that Community Council Boundaries of Dalry reflect the Parish/Post Code Boundaries
- Any other suggestions?


