

## **Autism Support Service for Adults**

A survey of 21 questions was circulated from 06.06.16 – 29.08.16 via Survey Monkey web link relating to the need for an autism support service for adults, and gathering views about the Adult Support Service (grant-funded by Hampshire County Council and provided by Autism Hampshire between April 2014 and April 2016). A total of 89 responses were received.

### **Summary**

This survey was aimed at adults with autism (18 and over) and their families and/or carers, or professionals that work with them. We did not receive enough responses to compile a conclusive report, therefore this is an outline and general summary of the responses we did receive. The survey was in two parts, part 1 was about the need for an autism support service for adults, and part 2 was about the Autism Support Service run by Autism Hampshire's Community Access Team.

#### Part 1

#### The need for an autism support service for adults

The majority of respondents were from Hampshire (94.4%), with the highest proportion from the Eastleigh Borough (19%), followed by New Forest District (16.5%). We had good representation from all of the other unitary authorities in Hampshire. Just over half (53.9%) of respondents were parents or carers of a person with autism, and 40% of respondents work with a person with autism.

The majority of responses concerned adults with autism who were in the 18-25 age bracket (44.9%), followed by the 26-39 age bracket (32.6%). The majority of those concerned described their autism or had it described for them as autism with accompanying learning difficulties (43.8%), followed by Asperger syndrome or high functioning autism (40.4%). Most (92.1%) had a formal diagnosis of autism.


The most widely used resource for finding out information about local support services was Autism Hampshire. 13 respondents do not look for any local services or support, and 3 respondents specified that they have had no help. The resources listed in order of popularity are listed in table 1 below.

The highest number of respondents disagreed that there is adequate information available locally about autism/Asperger syndrome services and support (31.5%), followed by those who strongly disagreed (28.1%). None of the respondents agreed with this statement. The majority of respondents agreed or strongly agreed that they would like one place to go to obtain all the information and advice they needed (85.4% in total).

The responses to question 10 – which autism support services would you use if they were available? - are shown in the graph below. The most popular option was a service with local drop-in sessions, followed by an e-mail service. Other services suggested by respondents included autism specialist legal advice service and a befriender service.



Only 29.2% of respondents have the Autism Alert Card or App issued by Autism Hampshire. It is hoped that the other respondents take advantage of this resource as a link to further information about the card was included in the survey.

Respondents were asked what they would want an Autism support service to offer, the answers are listed in table 2 in order of popularity. Employment advice was the most popular, but the other categories received votes across the board.

Part 2

#### Using the Autism Support Service run by Autism Hampshire's Community Access Scheme

The survey was targeted at users of the service, but the response from actual users was disappointingly low. Only 13.8% of respondents have used the Autism Support Service (12 out of 89 respondents). There are several ways that they found out about the service, see table 3.

The type of support they received are listed in table 4. The most common was employment advice and providing support at meetings/appointments.

When asked to rate the support that they received, the service was rated excellent by 13.3%, good by 20% and poor by 20%. The comments received were largely negative, one person mentioning that "We were surprised that they didn't offer home visits", and another that they were "trying to be helpful but mostly just signposting to services (e.g. Jobcentre plus, counselling, social groups) that did not help, were inaccessible or were inappropriate for my needs".

However, when asked how they would be affected if the service were to cease, there was a range of responses from "awful and suicidal" to "Not at all". Generally the responses highlighted concerns that if the service was to cease, respondents would be impacted negatively. See appendix 1 for comments. Four of the respondents do not know where to go for help if the service were to cease, others commented that they would seek help from other organisations such as Autism Wessex and HCC SAIL and Local Offer.

When asked how the service could be improved, five respondents commented that a more specialised service including 1:1 face to face visits in the person's own home would be an improvement. Two commented that it needs to be publicised better, especially online, and another two respondents called for better staffing levels within the service.

As we didn't get a very good response from users of the service, we can only make some very general comments about the results. This report will be fed back to the Hampshire Autism Partnership Board and other interested parties at Hampshire County Council.

We have found that we if we have the resources to offer a face to face meeting with people with Asperger's, we can support then to access local mainstream and specialist disability services like SAIL and they don't need an autism specific service. They need person centred support from their advocate to establish their needs then they can tell other services this is how they need to be supported. Everyone else has the signposting info that Autism Hampshire has, and if they aren't going to meet with people with Asperger's then I am not sure why the service is needed. I am not sure they were offering a service to people with a learning disability and autism.

I need such a service and I need it to be more effective and relevant to me than it has been.

Would not know where to go to receive be fit or other advice.

It would be a lost point of contact that I direct parent/ carers to.

This has been the only source of information and help I have been able to access it would leave our family. It is so important to have someone to talk to who understands and can advise and support.

# Question 18 If you are currently using, or have used this service, where would you go to meet your needs if this service was to cease?

As given in No.16, we went elsewhere anyway for some needs because we were unaware (not told) about the autism services available. Help with relationships, social skills and counselling specific to autism would be hard to find elsewhere. Winchester City Council offers advice on Housing, and JobCentre offers advice on Benefits. Wellness Centre in Winchester offers support but my son will not go near such a place with people with other problems.

In my opinion this service didn't meet our clients needs.

I don't wont them to cease as awareness for autism is needed

#### Question 19 Please give us your ideas on how the service can be improved

more professional advice more autism therapy led, more support, just more of everything...

Publicise it to those who need it. People should be referred on diagnosis so they know what's available from the start. Offer autism-related advice or practical support to groups or 1:1 at a centre, or 1:1 at a person's home, if they cannot deal with going out. Once they gain more skills and self-confidence they are more likely to be able to go out and meet others. For bright young people with Aspergers, involve university students with similar special interests, willing to be a visitor/friend and chat about that subject.

Be able to work with people on a face to face basis over the whole of Hampshire.

We need groups in the Portsmouth community area for adult with autism. Helpful information would be • An information pack for cares .I have learnt thought looking on the internet and from friend about free community benefits free ,access cards what care should our autistic people be offered in the way of support by county council. • Information pack for adult unsupported by family or friends. I think they is a lot of adult with autism unable to seek out help by themselves in the community.
