Cole Street celebrates 199 years of worship in Darby End

April 1st, as well as being April Fool's Day, is very significant in the life and history of Cole Street – it is the anniversary date of the opening of Cole Street in 1821 on the site which Cole Street still stands today. The original building, 'Darby End Wesleyan Chapel' opened on 1st April 1821 and was sited on what is now the upper car park at church. The building would be used as a Chapel and a Sunday School for the following 40 years and stood until 1950 (after some rebuilding and shoring-up work in the early 1900s due to subsidence). In 1950, it was deemed beyond reasonable repair when it was then replaced with today's building which opened in 1959 (using the Sunday School building erected in 1861 in the interim).

Of course, this means that next year marks our 200th anniversary – a significant occasion! Keep a look out for details about how we will mark this occasion when some kind of normality resumes!

Offering & Finances

The current situation presents Cole Street with a scenario which we have never had to face before. At present, Cole Street has no financial income as the building is closed. Cole Street is now on the verge of entering restricted funds, otherwise known as our reserves. These cater for around 6 months running costs of the building after which, funds will almost cease to exist.

Cole Street, as a growing, community-reaching church, has a significant expenditure each year in the following main areas: Assessments to the Circuit (formally known as Quaterage and payable by all Methodist churches to cover ministerial costs, manses, circuit assessments etc.), Running Costs (such as direct debits, services, gas, electric, water etc.), Property (insurance, inspections, licenses, maintenance, cleaning materials, toilet paper etc.) and other costs such as activities, events, productions etc. and of course any donations we make to charitable causes. Without factoring in any specific projects etc., it costs approximately on average, £1,800.00-£2,000.00 per month to remain open and ready for use by the church and the wider community (around £1,400.00 of this being in Assessments alone).

Cole Street, therefore, relies heavily on three main areas of income: external hire, fundraising events and your kind weekly offering and/or donations. With external hire and fundraising events out of the question for the foreseeable future, we are asking graciously that you continue to save your weekly offering so that when we return, our finances can be somewhat rebalanced. And of course, we can claim back Gift Aid on a certain percentage of the offering – usually quite a significant amount when this adds up throughout the year.

We, as a church, strive to enact our Mission Statement, of which part talks about making more disciples of God – in other words, reaching out into our community and being there for our community. This doesn't come without cost, both monetary and of time, which makes Cole Street such a beacon in Darby End.

Please continue to pray for our church, our church building and ask that God will protect and guide us, willingly, through this uncertain time.
