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NATURE IN EASTON 9

Do you remember the slogan 'Plant a tree in seventy-three'? The line of oak trees along the Stonely road were planted that February so they have now been there for nearly 33 years. (Three died and were replaced later.) The nine originals have an average girth at breast height of 0.77 metres. The large oak tree opposite Michael Picton's hedge near the 30 mph sign has a girth of 2.0 metres, while that in the hedgerow near the A14 has a girth of 3.4 metres. It is possible to calculate the ages of these mature oaks from a Forestry Commission note, but much depends on whether the growing conditions have been good, average or poor. My best estimate for the smaller of these is about 100 years and for the larger is 170-200 years. The big oak

nearest Michael Picton's garden was pollarded some 50 years ago and has grown a new head. It was once the nest site for Little Owls but one was killed on the road, probably when picking up an earthworm. Sadly, this year's brood of three young Barn owls died in Picton's barn some time in the autumn just when they were nearly independent. Even more sadly, one of the parents was killed crossing the A14 on 19th December. Has anyone seen the other adult since then? December 27th and the first snow!

CHURCH NEWS

The Bishop has announced that the Revd. Martin Kettle is to be non-stipendiary assistant priest in the seven East Leightonstone parishes (Easton, Ellington, Grafham, Spaldwick, Barham & Woolley, Alconbury-cum-Weston and Buckworth). In common with many non-stipendiary clergy, Father Martin has a full time job elsewhere. He is one of the governors at Whitemoor Prison, near March. At present, Father Martin is non-stipendiary curate in the Huntingdon team ministry. He will probably move to Alconbury in the spring.

Easton Church had its first ever Christingle service just before Christmas 2004. This year, the **Christingle** Service is taking place <u>after</u> Christmas, on Sunday 8th January at 4.00 p.m. Services during the rest of the month will be:-
