Strange phenomenon No. 2 from chez Avens: what bird of prey sits in a rabbit hole? Answer: a kestrel, not feeling very well. Jim Carolan saw it while taking his dogs for a walk (on the day after April's Fool Day!) and later took it to the Raptor Centre near Woodhurst. It seemed to improve for a time but suddenly died. Kestrels don't seem to have bred in Easton this year but Green woodpeckers have raised at least one young. Squirrels have

bred, too: Dorothy Fairey saw a pair of young ones playing on her lawn – Ahh, how sweet! On the less cuddly side, Jenny Hyde watched a young Grass snake basking in the sun on a lily pad in her garden pond, while Allison Gould also found a young one in her garden, but this had obviously upset the Queen of Hearts for it had lost its head! (Grass snakes have a pair of yellow marks behind the head while adders have a black zig-zag pattern all down the back – but they do not occur in Cambridgeshire south of the river Nene.) What a nice drop of rain we had on the 22nd in Easton to revive the Brook, at least temporarily – it was 22 mm after a total of 17¹/₂ mm in dribbles since the end of May, according to Roger. Apropos grasses, I found the delicate Matgrass-fescue on Kimbolton Airfield last month – a new Cambridgeshire record! The new wooded footpath beside the Jolly's Charity Field will be cleared and open this month at last, thanks to many pairs of hands.
