NATURE NOTES 20

Trees are hanging onto their leaves late this year, but haven't the hedgerows been colourful? Driving back from Ramsey recently, I traced a range from the pale green of Ash and pale yellow of Elm to the bronze and gold of Oak and Beech and flame yellow of Field-maples, which stood out a field's width away among the darker Blackthorn and Dog's-wood. Cherry trees seem less pink this year than usual but our Liquidamber and Parrotia make up for it with their brilliant scarlet, crimson and purple. Did you know, gardeners, that, although Liquidamber resembles maple in its leaves and London plane in its dangling

spiny fruits, it belongs in a different plant family from either – the Hamamelidaceae – with Parrotia and Witch-hazel? (Talking of superficial similarities, what about Wych-elm with its different spelling!) Autumn usually brings flocks of fieldfares and redwings but these seem to have delayed their arrival despite the feasts of berries and fallen fruit awaiting them. You may have heard the phrase 'a charm of goldfinches' but Beth recently heard and saw a 'clamour' of 200 jackdaws swirling round and round over Easton. I saw a red-admiral butterfly on the 13th of November hanging onto the late autumn sunshine, while a singing song-thrush on the 23rd also seemed to defy the season.
