Well done those energetic souls who rose before 5.30 a.m. two Saturdays ago to hear the small birds' melodies..., first uttered from my orchard trees! (I hope, though, you did not lie sleepless all night, like Wordsworth). Interestingly, it was almost exactly the same group that toured the village on 4th May 2002, and with very similar results: we heard 2 Chiffchaffs this time against 1 Willow warbler and a Spotted Woodpecker drumming last time, but seven species out of ten were the same top scorers. Has

anyone heard a cuckoo in the village this year? The 4 or 5 pairs of nesting Dunnocks are probably not enough to attract a cuckoo and the only one I have heard myself this year was at Holme Fen. I do remember the excitement of finding a cuckoo egg in a Dunnock nest in Hampshire when I was a boy. Turning to bees again, Heigham Jarvis invited me recently to investigate a strange phenomenon in his greenhouse. One plant pot had a cluster of circular leaf-cuttings sticking out of the compost. Carefully levering out the plant, we found half a dozen little cigar-like cylinders made of the same cut leaves each with a lid, and one that I opened was filled with a bright orange 'gum'. These were clearly the work of a leaf-cutting bee Megachile, which constructs these cells from rose leaves, usually underground, fills them with nectar, lays an egg on top and seals them. Heigham has now placed these cells in another pot of compost to see the adults that emerge in due course.
