NATURE NOTES 41

Season of mists and [very] mellow fruitfulness... - and fungi too: a wonderful great "fairy ring" of about 140 Shaggy Parasol mushrooms has appeared in the spinney near Hartham Street - while gathering swallows twitter in the skies. The only pairs of swallows we have twittering in Easton nowadays seem to be based around pony fields, though these are doing their best to raise two or even three broods. It is over 30 years since they nested in my garage, and house martins nesting under our eaves vanished even earlier. Without grazing pastures with livestock in the fields in Easton there are not enough insects in the air

these days to support many such aerial plankton feeders. Roger Silcock measured 142 mm (5 ½ in.) of rain in six weeks during August/September and this has meant a poor year for many butterflies with no local sightings of migrant Painted Ladies, though Speckled Wood and Comma butterflies have done well.

As an addendum to last month's note about Cabbage Whites, I discovered a chrysalis of one on a cactus plant in my greenhouse, some seven yards from where the caterpillars were feeding – quite a trek! The most interesting local bird records recently have been a Green Sandpiper on a pond at Lodge Farm, Spoonbills at Grafham Water and four juvenile Crossbills in a spruce tree at Stow Longa. These evidently followed the "irruption" of Crossbills noticed along the east coast during June and July this year, from Scandinavia or the continent.
