BROCK THE BADGER



I found this badger on 29th September lying dead in the middle of Sam's field and brought him up to the house in the barrow because it is so rare to see a badger (albeit dead) in one piece. They are usually to be glimpsed in semi-recognisable heaps on the edge of the A14. He looks very comfortable in the wheelbarrow. The sight of him provoked different reactions in people: a few neighbours felt sad, some were curious, and a friend from Spaldwick had her eye on him for potential manufacture of badger-bristle paintbrushes! Ernest Dudley, a reasonably obscure author, radio host and journalist who died in 2006 after a chequered working life spanning 80 years, had this to say about badgers: "What is important about the badger is that it has survived. It is still here. It has not, like so many of our wild

animals - the wolf, the wild boar, as well as the bear - been hunted into extinction. Man might have done his best to wipe it out but he has failed.' Indeed, it was man's torment of badgers which gave rise to the phrase 'to badger someone', which means to repetitively annoy or irritate. It comes from the hopefully now defunct activity of badger-baiting, when a badger was put in an upturned barrel and dogs were set onto it to drag it out. When the animals emerged the badger was separated from the hounds and put back in the barrel and the process repeated, until the badger's inevitable demise. Nowadays, the debate continues as to whether they are the cute creatures depicted in children's books and on programmes such as "Springwatch" or the dairy farmer's enemy as spreaders of TB among cattle. Incidentally, "Brock" is old English for Badger and appears in a number of place names, such as Brockhampton and Brockenhurst.

CLOSURE OF HARTHAM STREET

The route between Stocking Lane, Easton and Grafham Water which is known as Hartham Street is badly rutted and needs to be repaired. The intention is to level the surface for the whole length and to carry out some light cutting back of the adjoining hedgerows. It is also intended to improve the surface of the byway for a 300m section to link the adjoining bridleways and install wooden posts and plant a hedge at two locations along the edge of the byway to stop motor vehicles from straying onto adjoining land. In order for these works to be completed safely it will be necessary to close the byway for the duration of the works which it is hoped will take no more than two weeks. The starting date was expected to be some time in October.

SUCCESSFUL PROSECUTION
