There have been several reports of a Red Kite in Easton recently, and John Blatch has reported one over Spaldwick too, so this morning I was delighted to watch one myself circling over the central field at Easton. For a long time they were restricted to Wales but they were saved from national extinction by one of the world's longest running protection programmes, and have now been successfully re-introduced to England and Scotland by the RSPB. They feed on carrion, small mammals and worms and there are now over 1000 pairs in Britain. They are breeding at Holme Fen and in Northamptonshire, and there is no reason why they should not colonise one of our other local woodlands in the next few years. Apart from the Buzzard, which is also well established locally, the only other large breeding raptor in the county is the Marsh Harrier, which breeds at Fen Drayton Pits, and which I saw last year. There, too, you will hear or see a large selection of song birds, including Yellow hammer, Whitethroat, Lesser Whitethroat, Blackcap, Garden Warbler, Reed and Sedge Warblers, as well as Cuckoo. Don't forget our own "Spring Listen" walk around Easton on Saturday 8th May starting at Brook House about 6 a.m. and finishing with breakfast at the Bells, 4 Broadweir.
