Summer is i-comin in/ Loudly sing cuckoo/ Groweth seed and bloweth mead/ and springs the wood anew. Well, Roger Silcock has heard a passing cuckoo in Easton, and Ray Ellis has heard two turtle doves, but they haven't set up territory at the end of our garden this year for the first time that I can remember. And just when I thought nobody seemed to have had nesting spotted flycatchers this year, Gwen Tomline reported a Spotted Flycatcher on her bird bath on 26th June. All three species are in national decline and we are noticing the effects here. Luckily, little owls seem OK as Melissa says she watches these on the church from her bedroom window. Butterflies seem very sparse this year, apart from Orange Tips and Speckled Woods, but Meadow Browns have just started to appear and Ray reports an early Painted Lady. The prize this month must go to Marilyn and Denis Jolly who have sent me this magnificent photograph of a Humming-bird Hawk Moth in their garden, possibly a very early migrant from the Continent, although I kept one in my garage over winter a few years ago.

CHURCH NEWS

Services in Easton during July will be: 4th July 9.30 a.m. Eucharist;

BISHOP'S VISIT - 20th JUNE

Over 75 villagers and invited guests attended the inauguration of the new facilities in the Church, which included a short service of dedication by Bishop David of Huntingdon. In his blog after the event, Bishop David wrote: "Easton has just given its a church a real birthday. They've raised pots of money to put in a new stone floor, relocate the font, and use the new space to install a smashing new community room and "facilities". Since the next



largest gathering space in the village would seem to be the telephone box, the new



space is already in demand from all sorts of users, and it looks like being a great success. I was there on Sunday with lots of other people (above) to share a strawberry tea and bless the new works - and say very well done indeed to all who made it possible. The last time the church had a makeover was a hundred years ago and the new work is a fitting contribution for another century, but now the team have got the wind in their sails I hope they keep on going and come up with some more good schemes as this lovely mini-cathedral of a church comes to life". Canon Jonathan Young said : "This is a very exciting project in the life of

Easton Parish. Every century has contributed something to the care and development of the Church and now, in the 21st century, we are opening the building wider still to the whole community."
