Till they should think warm days will never cease— 'they' are bees, of course. The season of mellow fruitfulness is upon us again and yesterday (24th) I saw a honey bee, a wasp, two kinds of bumblebees, at least twenty red admiral butterflies and hundreds of hover flies sucking nectar from a long bank of ivy flower in the grounds of Ramsey Abbey. My French Wasp nest, suspended from a branch in a conifer and so beautifully maintained, was abandoned weeks ago as the new queen or queens sought places to hibernate. The workers, deprived of a reason for being, had abandoned it and within a few days the outer papier mâché skin had frayed and, when cut away, it revealed a series of horizontal plates made up of hexagonal cells, just like those in a honeycomb, where the wasp grubs would have been reared.

Various creatures seem to like coming indoors in the autumn. Among the most common in our house are Drone flies which look like fat bees but are just large hoverflies. They cruise around noisily and end up at windows where I simply pick them up and take them outside again. Autumn is also a good time for fungi and Sheila Wells, our fungal expert friend, recently discovered Bonfire Cauliflower Pepiza proteana in the north east corner of Easton churchyard. This looks rather like a yellow sponge or cauliflower half buried among leaves. The only other Huntingdonshire record is from a bonfire site at Hinchingbrooke Park in 1990; do I detect Mike Baker's footprint here?
