## NATURE NOTES 69



My October issue of *British Wildlife* contained an article on 'Large house spiders in the British Isles: past, present and future' and, as I had just photographed one in our living room, I thought I might pass on a few facts you've always wanted to know! There are three large species in England and ours here is clearly *Tegenaria gigantea*, with body lengths up to 16 millimetres and leg spans about four times that (2½ inches). As the article says, "their size, hairiness and habit of stopping in the middle of floors make them the *bête noir* of those suffering from arachnophobia." They mature in the autumn and the males then wander around looking for females, "racing across rooms and falling into sinks and bathtubs". With the onset of cold weather the males die but the females

overwinter in a chosen retreat and lay up to ten egg sacs in the spring. The author ends by asking for live specimens to be sent from northern England and Scotland to study distributions and hybridisation, so next time you head north be sure to take a large empty matchbox with you!

On a less hairy but more prickly note, if anyone has seen a hedgehog this year, please let me know.

## WOOLLEY HILL WIND FARM INQUIRY

The Woolley Hill Wind Farm Inquiry is being held at the Council Offices, Pathfinder House, Huntingdon from 10<sup>th</sup> January and is expected to last until around 20<sup>th</sup> January. The Action Group now has a barrister, Peter Jennings, to represent them. Beth Davis has been asked to supply a written statement on the Landscape and History of the site; she has found that Weybridge Forest, that abuts the site, was the hunting forest of James I. A document and seal giving the wardenship of the forest to Sir Oliver Cromwell of Hinchingbrooke House is in the Huntingdon Record Office. The wind farm site shares an ancient boundary with the forest, and Weybridge Lodge, formerly in the forest, is the hunting lodge perhaps built for James I and is largely intact. It is now surrounded by later buildings.
