A juvenile Spotted Woodpecker broke its neck flying into our kitchen window, no doubt mistaking the reflection of trees for a throughway garden vista. Such are the casualties of youth and inexperience! We saw it only the day before having a whole body rinse in our bird bath and then being joined by its mother (with no red on its head) which had been feeding from the peanut dispenser outside the kitchen. Luckily, there was another chick which I photographed and we have enjoyed watching the mother feeding it on a branch. Sarah Harrison rescued a young Robin from her cat recently and I let it hop under a broken pot on our side of the fence where it could still call its parent. It had moved by the evening and more recently we saw the adult in a tree with two speckled young so perhaps it survived. Years ago, Michael Picton told me he had found a dead Kingfisher on his lawn under a

window. This must be a very rare visitor to Easton, although one was seen along the Brook in the late 1970s in the days when it held water, and Beth met the judges for the 'Best kept village' in the Leightonstone district. They commented on how lovely the brook-side was, awash with Queen Anne's Lace, and said they would be nominating Easton, though there is no record of our actually receiving the award. Tony Ellis told me another story of yesteryear about finding a cuckoo's egg in a Spotted Flycatcher's nest on the front of his house. A pair of Spotted Flycatchers appeared in our garden on 13th June this year; no Cuckoo but we heard the first gentle purring of a Turtle Dove in the Playing Field on the 19th – a herald of summer at last?
