### FARMER BURTON'S COUNTRY TALK



We finished harvest on August 30<sup>th</sup>. This was about 3 weeks later than usual because of the cold Spring, but it is all now safely gathered in. What a relief, as it takes 11 months to grow and it only needs a heavy hail storm to ruin a crop. I am quite pleased as yields on both the wheat and rape were good but world prices are down compared to last year (so Jill, you don't need to get too excited!!).

As soon as harvest is over, the work begins to prepare the land for the next crop. One job that we needed to do after last year's very wet weather is to drain the fields and to get rid of any soil compaction on our heavy clay fields. I do this with a mole (not a live one!!) drainer. This is an implement that is pulled behind a tractor and it is made up of a leg (which cuts a slot through the soil to a depth of 2 feet) that has a bullet shaped foot that makes a 4-inch hole in the clay) and then behind the foot is pulled an expander that forces the hole larger by another inch. The clay at this depth is like plasticine and will

retain this mole channel for several years. The rain water will flow down to these mole drains and find its way to the ditch because if a field is water-logged, it will not grow a crop. Large farmers don't like this job as it is time-consuming, needs high horse power and is expensive.

Another job this time of year is hedge-trimming which I have been doing in Easton. I do this every 1-2 years to keep the hedges tidy, safer for pedestrians and drivers, and it helps to keep the hedge thick and livestock proof. When doing some land work last week, my tractor was being attacked by an aggressive cock pheasant which kept going for the front tyres on my 210 horse power, 8 ton tractor. Perhaps it was trying to get its own back before the shooting season gets under way!? In the next 2 weeks we will start to drill (sow the wheat seeds) and hope for a nice rain afterwards to get the seed to germinate, but not TOO much this year!

It would be a shame if Easton's green lane gets like Spaldwick's track to the village, which is so bad with dog poo that residents don't walk there anymore.
