# **CHURCH SERVICES DURING MAY**

Frogspawn and golden kingcups in the Brook, a song thrush nesting in the churchyard hedge, the first nightingale heard in Savages Spinney, and the first orange-tip butterflies, all herald the new burst of spring life. It's interesting that the spawn is ever only downstream from the little footbridge, while the thrush has chosen a patch of ivy to conceal its nest from predaceous eyes. I found it by accident, though the singing male has been advertising its territory with deafening song for weeks. Another spring marker is this strange Bleach Cup fungus which Ray spotted in the churchyard. Its scientific name is Disciotis venosa, suggesting venom, and it is, indeed, poisonous, though it belongs among the morels, some of which are excellent to eat and highly sought after. I'm sure that a muntjac goes through the churchyard regularly as you can see its scrabble footprints on both sides of the Brook opposite the gap between the churchyard wall and hedge. It doesn't seem to eat any toadstools, though: it clearly prefers the range of shrubs that our garden offers - a deer-expert friend of ours once said he could see the browse line in our garden.

# SUPERFAST BROADBAND FOR EASTON

There has been continuing work to roll out this service for a number of local communities, but no further progress for Easton was shown on the Connecting Cambridgeshire (CC) web site (<u>www.connectingcambridgeshire.co.uk</u>). A recent enquiry to the CC co-ordinators has confirmed that Easton is still on track for completion from June to September this year but there is no further update available yet.

To get superfast broadband speeds you will need to subscribe to a superfast broadband service once it is available. You will be able to order superfast broadband from all major Internet Service Providers (ISPs) as well as BT. The actual speeds that will be available to us at Easton should be able to be confirmed about a month before the work starts.

# FREE COMPOSTED MANURE FOR THE SPRING GARDEN

As is customary at this time of year, composted horse manure will be available free from Springfield in Chapel Lane (opposite the village water pump) each weekend over the next few weeks. With the continuing assistance of the railway at Springfield, the manure is dug out of the stockpile once it has composted for about 12-18 months. Starting at Easter until mid-May, villagers are free to come over with a wheelbarrow and help themselves to as much as they want from the driveway (help will be given with loading if required).

Also, for this year only we have a sufficient quantity of bags available to offer this as a delivered service around Easton at £1 per bag delivered to your door (or garden!).
