## FARMER BURTON'S COUNTRY TALK

Sunshine and showers make a happy farmer, with crops being weeks ahead than this time last year. Wheat ears began to emerge 4 weeks earlier and rape flowered the earliest I have seen. The rape looks really well this year (it would as I decided not to grow any in 2014!). But with all farming, 'you don't count your chickens until they are hatched' or until the crop is in the barn, as storms, pests and disease can change everything.

Last weekend I went and stayed in Norfolk with my brother-in-law who is a beef farmer. He was telling me how beef prices have fallen by 50p/kg deadweight in 12 months and share of shelf price (butchered and packed price) has shrunk even further. Tesco, Sainsburys and Asda have said that they will continue to sell

Irish beef but UK farmers have called upon supermarkets to stop prices falling and stock more British beef. Some farmers are selling up, so please try to buy British beef when you can.

We have spent the last week doing game-keeping work. Keeping down the number of magpies and carrion crows is an ongoing task. These birds, if left to increase in large numbers, will cause havoc with birds in our gardens and farmland as they love to devour eggs and chicks. One friend has lost ducklings and seen magpies swoop down and carry them away and another has no garden birds left after being invaded by a magpie family. Magpies and crows (part of the Corvid family) will even attack livestock, picking at the eyes of newborn calves and lambs: even the RSPB culls magpies and crows at some of its reserves where predation has become a problem and bird numbers had dropped alarmingly.
