# FARMER BURTON'S COUNTRY TALK



As I sit in my office writing this, I wonder if I have any crops left. We are in the middle of a thunderstorm with rain so heavy it's like stair-rods coming down. This is not what I need just a few days before harvest. The ear of wheat is at its heaviest now, full of grain inside an ear. It would only take some hail to knock this out or heavy rain to flatten the straw to ground level (like a steam roller has been let loose on the field!). When you have spent nearly a year growing this crop you don't want it flat on the ground as you lose quality and it is very difficult to lift it up enough to combine.

The farmer's big enemy this year is Black Grass which we get on heavy, clay soil and it has been a problem since farmers stopped straw burning in 1993. For those youngsters in the village, this was when farmers could cultivate around the outside of their fields after harvest and set fire to the straw/stubble to leave just a field of black ash (after quite a lot of smoke!). This ash was a supply of fertiliser for the following crop and the burn killed all of the black grass seed that was lying on top of the ground

and thus we did not have to use expensive chemicals (that now rarely work!).

Black grass was first found in 1982 and now 16,000 farms in 24 countries have a problem. It has become herbicide resistant and can be seen in wheat fields easily as a fine grass whose head is above the crop. It will grow up to 80cm tall and often in tufts. It is a major weed in cereal crops as it produces a large amount of seed which is shed before the crop is harvested. It will seriously reduce the crop yield and is so difficult to control and kill. There are research and trials going on throughout the country looking at how using stale seedbeds (preparing the land for sowing a crop and then spraying it off when it has greened up with grass and other weeds) and drilling Spring crops (such as Spring Barley, Rape and Beans) that use different chemicals can all help.

PS. I have just counted about 30 swallows flying in our garden and Jill tells me we have 5 spotted flycatchers: is this good, Brian?

While James and I were cleaning out the grain store ready for harvest yesterday (22 July) I heard a single scratching sound. We waited and heard it again from behind the grain walling, so we got a ladder, climbed up and looked down behind the 10ft high walling to see a young barn owl stuck at the bottom, gazing up at us. An emergency plan sprung into action!! I got my big angle grinder to cut a hole in the metal walling and James got a damp cloth to drop on the owl so that the sparks did not burn our patient's feathers. Five minutes later and our owl was lifted out and flew off (after biting on my fingers several times!). Today we are blanking off the top of the walling so it cannot happen again.

They also conduct world-class research into stem cell matching and transplants, so they can make sure every person in need gets the best possible treatment. ## "THE LAST DAY OF PEACE" FAMILY EVENT

Cambridgeshire County Council is part of 'The Great War - Between the lines' project and they are holding a free commemorative event on 3<sup>rd</sup> August 2014, from 1-5pm in Hinchingbrooke House, Huntingdon. The event aims to raise awareness of this hugely important milestone in world history. "The Last Day of Peace" will include activities of interest to all ages. The event will be attended by the deputy Lord Lieutenant of Cambridgeshire and will include re-enactors in costume to help bring alive the spirit of the Great War, as well as The Music Hall Society who will perform music of the period. Somersham Brass Band will also be playing music from the war years. The Combat Veteran Players will perform short extracts from Hamlet and selected Rupert Brooke readings. There will also be: Six exhibitions including photographs, documents and letters from Cambridgeshire, Belgium and France; Vignettes and reading of letters to and from the front; displays from St Neots Museum; Expert advice on family history from Cambridgeshire Archives. There will also be Vintage Cycles, a display of Shire Horses in the grounds and a veteran car. And of course light refreshments will be on sale.
