FROM THE FARMER'S WIFE

As many of you know, I grew up in the centre of Norfolk on a livestock farm, Norfolk being famous for its coastline, Sandringham (home of our Queen) and Bernard Matthews!!

Talking about turkeys, they have been, and still are, an important part of Norfolk's heritage, thriving on our light land. Turkeys originated from Mexico, not Turkey, and fossils found prove they have been about for 10 million years! They were first brought to Britain in 1526 by a Yorkshire man, William Strickland, who acquired 6 birds from American Indian traders. Henry VIII was the first English King to enjoy turkey, making it fashionable to eat at Christmas instead of peacocks (the best Christmas peacocks had ever had!). By 1720, 250,000 turkeys were walked from Norfolk to London in flocks. They started in August and fed on the stubble fields and at feeding stations along the A12 road. Their feet were dipped in tar to protect them, but I'm not sure how tender the drumsticks would be by Christmas day! ??

Turkeys have always been a luxury and in 1930 it cost a week's wage to buy one. Bronze turkeys are the original breed colour, but Norfolk is famed for its Black turkeys. Females are called hens, males called stags and young under 5 weeks called poults. Turkey farming was an important part of my grandfather's farm. He would rear 1,000 birds each Christmas and local villagers would help pluck these birds, which would be sent to Smithfield market in London. Anyone who rears turkeys this year would be having a nightmare, unless they have a refrigeration container, as when they have been plucked and prepared, they need to be kept cold. The weather is around 14° at present! One man I remember, would come to Norfolk each year to buy over 100 turkeys for the workers of a factory he owned. He would tell us of the bartering that went on at the factory gate. The longer you had worked for his firm, the larger the bird, so an elderly man who had no family could get a 50lb bird and a young chap with loads of kids would end up with a 'sparrow'!! I hope you all had a real "bootiful" Christmas lunch whether it was turkey or not!

The emergency medical services attempt to resuscitate over 80 people a day following a cardiac arrest in the UK. You can help give those people a better chance of survival by taking part in CPR training in our community. It is planned to offer training during January and February 2016 in the church community room. Sessions will last 30 minutes and each will consist of a maximum 10 trainees.
