NATURE NOTE 93

Having recently returned from a cruise along the Caribbean coast of Central America, I thought I would say something about the animals we saw. One of the most distinctive groups of New-World mammals are the prehensile-tailed monkeys, like the Howler monkey and Spider monkey, which we both saw and heard. These belong to a different Suborder from African and Asian monkeys which don't have prehensile tails but they must have shared a common ancestor some 60 million years ago before continental drift separated Africa and south America. The other characteristic group we saw in Costa Rica were the tree sloths, both the Two-toed and the Three-toed, looking rather like brown hessian sacks draped from the upper branches of tall trees. The latter has a dark streak all down its back so you don't have to count the

enormous hooked toes to identify it. They seem to spend all their lives suspended upside down, including having young, except that, like cats, they like to bury their poo so they have to come down to the ground for this, presumably, so as not to betray their static position overhead. Oddly, their nearest relatives are the Armadillo and the Giant anteater, all of which belong to a group called Edentata, because of their reduced or absent teeth. There used to be a Giant ground sloth which became extinct in the Americas along with ancient horses, mammoths, giant bison, proto-camels and Dire wolf around 10,000 years ago, after the arrival of the first human colonists from Beringia (now under the Bering Sea). We also saw Peccaries, Racoons and a black cat-like animal called a Jaguarondi in a 'Rescue Centre' in Costa Rica, where animals were being prepared for resettlement in the wild. We didn't see a Jaguar, but these seem to be doing well in huge jungle National Parks in Belize to Panama.

CONCERT REVIEW

Thursday 18th February once again revealed the depth of Easton's musical talent in the beautiful setting of All Souls Church near to the BBC headquarters in London. The occasion was a Chamber Music Concert in aid of *Help for Heroes*, with all of the music written by our own Michael Lawson. The large

audience ranged from a baby aged one week to the silver

surfers of Easton and we were treated to a wide range of musical styles from classic to contemporary, written for a diversity of instrumental and vocal groupings. Reflecting the theme of *Help for Heroes*, the music was interspersed with readings from WW1 poet Wilfred Owen.

The highlight, however, which resulted in the loudest applause of the evening was our virtuoso Rob Burton playing three pieces on saxophone, written specially for him by Michael, with a fine piano accompaniment by Grace Yeo. The lyrical, jazz feel of the pieces struck a chord with the audience, closing the first half of the concert on a high.

The evening finished on another high with a piece written for flute and string quartet which seemed to capture a timeless view of England and a feeling of optimism for its future.
