FARMER BURTON'S COUNTRY TALK

What a year!! Weather, Brexit, a new Prime Minister and a DEFRA reshuffle, all before harvest! Three weeks ago, we were busy cutting our grass/wild flower margins for haylage. This is grass that has been cut for a day or two to wilt, then baled and wrapped in polythene and natural fermentation inside the bag preserves the grass as **haylage** - which retains 90% of the feed value of fresh grass.



Our rape was combined by the 20th July after being swathed 10 days earlier. There are 2 ways

of combining rape: one is to spray it off to kill the plant, so the pods ripen and then it is direct combined and the other is to swath it first (this a combine-like machine but it only cuts the rape and then puts it in a row behind the machine without threshing out the seed, which then sits on top of the stubble and dries out), which is what we decided to do. We have done it both ways in the past but have found swathing ripens the pods faster and more evenly. Yields were a little disappointing considering the cost to grow the crop, but this has been seen throughout the country because of the mild Winter and dull June. We hope to start the wheat harvest by the first week of August.



What will Brexit mean to farming is a huge question. The horticultural producers are really worried about what effect the restricted movement of migrant labour will have, which is relied upon to pick the vegetables etc. For more than 40 years UK farmers have relied on subsidies from the EU Common Agricultural Policy (CAP) to compete, but the referendum has created huge uncertainty about support for our industry and single market. Many in farming believe Brexit will bring greater opportunities in the short term, as a drop in Sterling has seen an improvement in our competitive position which has helped exports and price. Europe has tied us up in Red Tape which could make it impossible to continue farming. The EU is looking to not renew the license for Glyphosate so it could be banned within 2 years. It is used in many garden products (Round-up) and our farm would be unviable without it as it is invaluable in the battle against Blackgrass (BG).

I was asked a couple of questions about the countryside recently. One was what field operations were being made on the left hand side near the Railway Bridge. These 2 fields have been fallow since last Summer and have been busted to loosen the soils' compaction and then power-harrowed to create a finer soil profile to get the Blackgrass chitting so it could be sprayed off. I plan to do this several times and will then put it into Spring Wheat in April next year. This will yield less than Winter Wheat but allow me another 6 months of killing BG (no relation to the BFG!).



Have any of you noticed the 2 tone field of wheat between the Brampton Racecourse and Spittals roundabout, on the left? This field is all wheat but the lighter colour is Winter Wheat that is much riper than the more green wheat that was drilled much later (and consequently, it will be harvested several weeks later). Probably caught out by the weather, drilling was resumed when it got dry enough to get back on the land.
