fungi – when a few showers of rain have stimulated those unseen webs of fungal threads, in the ground or within a log, to organise themselves one night and throw up a fruiting body that we call a mushroom, preparing to disperse a million spores into the air. Keen mycologists will gather this Sunday 23<sup>rd</sup>, punnet in hand, to search Holland Wood, courtesy of Lord de Ramsey. Wintering flocks of thrushes have yet to come, but all manner of non-local birds may find Easton a welcoming stopover on their way across the country - like the Grey wagtail that (once again) has chosen Coniston garden to put in an appearance. Unlike the commoner Pied wagtail, this normally frequents upland streams.

What does Autumn mean to you - besides mists and mellow fruitfulness, departing swallows, and swirls of leaves about your feet? The other misty morning our garden was festooned with spiders' webs including this dew-covered orb of engineering extravagance, and dozens of tiny hammocks on the lawn made by money-spiders. Red admiral butterflies are still lingering around my ivy blossom, up to ten at one time together with a hornet, some wasps, drone flies and several other large hoverflies mimicking honeybees and wasps: if it looks like a honeybee or wasp but you can't see antennae sticking out of its head, then it's probably a hoverfly. Drone flies tend to come indoors at this time of year and buzz noisily against windows, and I enjoy picking them up and holding them inside my clenched fist up to someone's ear, which always elicits a most rewarding response! All worker and male wasps, hornets and bumblebees die off at the onset of winter, leaving only hibernating queens to start all over
