FARMER BURTON'S COUNTRY TALK

I'm very pleased to tell you that I finally got my Spring Barley harvested and safely in the barn after a very trying year! We had the Beast from the East with some very hard frosts, a very wet, cold Spring, and then when I finally managed to drill my Spring barley (much later than I had liked to) we had the hottest Summer for decades! We started combining the barley from the 7th August and it came in nice and dry. The yield was down a third on last year's crop (just over 2 tons/acre) but, hopefully, it may go for malting which will gain a premium.

Wheat and barley prices both improved up to last week but US/China and Brexit news is making currency and



the commodity market very nervous. Farmers who grow oilseed rape are struggling with the lack of rain and the land is so hard they have had poor germination. Many will be forced to re-drill and their crops have been hit hard with Flea Beetle - I heard of one farmer spraying his rape ten times to kill the beetles! East Anglian growers have been asked to submit live samples of these beetles to test for resistance from insecticides. I'm really glad that I'm not growing any this year but I feel for the farmers that are.

We have had a little rain recently which was so needed, as I'm struggling to move any of our heavy, clay land because it has set like concrete. I use a buster to penetrate the soil but many farmers have broken equipment trying to do so (not to mention the odd farmer's back!). The rain is also needed to germinate weeds so I can try and control them before drilling.

I'm afraid that many of you will be noticing that prices in the shops have risen for fruit and veg. Potatoes, onions and carrot crops have been badly hit by the Summer drought. My local Fish and Chip shop at Thrapston said that a bag of spuds has risen from £5 to £11 but, (with the help of several villagers from Easton), I bet he'll still be making a good profit!
