#### **EASTON PARISH CHURCH.... IN LEGO?!!**



Recent visitors to St. Peter's Church may have noticed an astonishing model of the building, made entirely out of Lego. This has been constructed by Charles Nixon, who explained that it took about 6 months to build during the Spring and Autumn of this year. "It is a very therapeutic hobby and is Ideal in the dark months," he said. "The model consists of about 3,000 bricks. I started with the Lego Architect set but had regularly to add to this with specialist bricks for the spire and windows".

Charles explained that the hardest part was to get the proportions right without a

plan. The building of the aisles was particularly tricky in that they kept collapsing without constructing pillars to take the weight, but this is just how it is in the actual church. "It's remarkable to realise" he said, "how much detail and expertise went into the construction of the original church all those hundreds of years ago. Also, the building into the aisle wall of the spiral staircase had to be accommodated with round bricks on the exterior, just as in the actual church. Next, the angle of the spire was problematic because Lego just don't make any bricks at that angle. I had to rebuild the base of the tower three times in order to get sufficient width to support a reasonable height spire. I have managed to get most of the windows in proportion and have placed a battery candle inside to light up the church. I hope villagers enjoy it". We are sure they will - and what an amazing challenge to take on!

### ST PETER'S CHURCH QUINQUENNIAL REPORT

### **Easton Parochial Church Council**

Every five years our church architect, David Llewellyn, writes a complete report on the fabric of the building; it is a guide to the repairs that are needed over the next five years. The PCC, which is responsible for the repairs, has just received the report which we discussed carefully at our last meeting. Our church building is shared with the village, it is our community centre and we all take certain responsibilities for maintaining it in a good and safe condition. From Medieval times the nave and aisle were the great 'hall' of the villagers for all their meetings and celebrations to the present day. The chancel was always the sacred space and is the responsibility of the patron; our patron is the Church Commissioners. In the Quinquennial Report the lead roof of the chancel was found to be in very poor condition and David Llewellyn has recommended that repairs are carried out in the very near future. Our other lead roofs were also found to be nearing the end of their life. These are the two major items we need to face in the near future; repairing the nave and aisle roofs for us will be a big undertaking and we need to prepare for this by looking for grant aid and to raise a sum of money ourselves to contribute towards this. The Church Commissioners need to be notified of the condition of the chancel roof.

Another item, the churchyard wall was rebuilt about 10 years ago and we need to continue replacing this in stages. Perhaps grants could be found for this too, or maybe it could be rebuilt in memory of villagers with a plaque set in the brickwork. This is an idea for you all to think about. A copy of the Quinquennial report is in a GREEN folder in the church for you all to read, it is very readable. The PCC welcome ideas, please share this with us.
