# THE BRAMPTON HUT Beth Davis



With all the changes to the important junction of the A1 with the A14 today, you may wonder why it is still called the Brampton Hut interchange. Why Hut? Huts or inns formed a network of post stations which once served the delivery of the post across the country. Many huts and inns date back to the 16<sup>th</sup> century when post was brought on horseback or by postmen on foot and needed shelter. The hut was a simple building which later became a hostelry after the Turnpike act of 1663. The Great North Road in Huntingdonshire became the first highway to have a turnpike trust in the country; it ensured the regular surfacing of the highway. The site of the hut or hostelry eventually became an hotel during the coaching days of the 18<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> centuries. It retained its name, the Brampton Hut Hotel, but was also known to some as "Creamers Hut". The original brick building on the righthand side in the photograph was extended perhaps in

the mid-19<sup>th</sup> century, the hotel sign is displayed above the roof. Country lads from the villages around remember the Brampton Hut for its games room at the back.

Are there any more village memories? I remember the floods in the 1960s; (the photograph was taken in the 1959 floods). As you drive past on the A14 look at how the road levels have changed.

## FOOTPATHS AND BYWAYS UPDATE Easton Parish Council

Over the last couple of years, a number of villagers have suffered attacks on their dogs when out walking just outside the village, in the area of Stonely Road near the old barn. This is in use as unauthorised stables and a public footpath runs alongside the building. Two or three dogs have been kept there that have been the subject of restraining orders due to the attacks. Action had been taken previously under the Anti-Social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act, finally resulting in a Community Protection Notice being served in November 2016. However, there had been repeated sightings of the dogs out loose without their owners.

Following pressure by the Parish Council, at the end of 2017 Huntingdonshire Council finally decided to press charges due to the inability of the owners to keep the dogs under control.

After a long delay, the court case was finally heard in September 2018 and the owners were found guilty of being unable to keep their dogs under control. The sentencing was heard on the 18th December and the owners were fined. As a considerable time had passed since the last report of an attack or the dogs escaping, the owners were not banned from keeping dogs at this location. The sentencing failed to realise that many villagers had been avoiding use of this footpath past the barn for some time and this was likely to be the key factor in the reduction of incidents. Although the dogs appear still to be kept at the barn, it is the view of Huntingdonshire Council who pressed the charges that people should now feel free to walk on this footpath and the roads in the area. They now believe that the dogs are being properly caged and supervised at all times.
