### **SUMMER IS ICUMEN IN...**



When did you last hear a Cuckoo in Easton? I don't think I have heard one for at least 10 probably years, more. Traditionally, and in spite of their bad press for laying their eggs in the nests of other birds, they were once a regular subject of letters to The Times, with corresponddents vying record the first one!

Nowadays, social media is probably a more popular medium than letters to *The Times* and according to a reliable user of Facebook, one was heard by several people in the Pertenhall area early last week, so they are around somewhere. According to the British Trust for Ornithology, we have lost over half the number of Cuckoos in the UK over the last 20 years and since 2011, they have been satellitetracking Cuckoos to find out why. They generally arrive in this country about the middle of April, having spent the winter in the Congo basin of central Africa. For more information, look up www.bto.org.

That will not, however, feed you some of the delightful country lore regarding the birds that I find in my antiquarian British Birds in their Haunts (1909) which tells me that the Cuckoo arrives in this country about the middle of April. "The song of the Cuckoo, I need scarcely remark, consists of but two notes, of which the upper is, I believe, invariably E flat, the lower most frequently C natural, forming, however, not a perfect musical interval, but something between a minor and a major third. Towards the end of June, the Cuckoo, according to the old adage, 'alters its tune', which at first loses its musical character and soon ceases altogether. In July the old birds leave us, the males by themselves first, and the females not many days after; but the young birds remain until October."
