# FARMER BURTON'S COUNTRY TALK

When I last wrote, I was desperate for some dry weather so I could get on the land to drill (sow) our Spring Barley crop. I had accepted the thought that I was not going to get any crop in the ground this year because of the wet, cold, weather but it suddenly dried up mid-April and I started drilling the following week and finished on April 26<sup>th</sup>. If I hadn't got drilling by May 1st it would have been too late to start because of the length of growing season that Spring Barley needs, so it was getting very close! The barley went in the ground well and we rolled it before the weather turned for the worse again. Today I have been applying some Nitrogen fertiliser to get it growing and it needs a rain - am I never satisfied??!

Last week we were cutting grass for haylage and hay (for the latter you need a good week of drying, sunny weather). Hay is a grass legume or other herbaceous plants that has been cut, dried over several days by turning regularly, throwing out and rowing up until it is as dry as possible and then baled. This is used by livestock and horses over the Winter months when food is in short supply or if the land is too wet to turn the cattle out onto the fields in the Spring. Haylage is different as it is dried for a short time but then baled and wrapped in plastic to aid fermentation of the grass. It is about 45-75% dry matter, whereas silage (which is usually fed to cows) is much wetter at 35-50%. Haylage must be stored for several months before it can be fed to livestock as, if not fully fermented, it would make the animal very ill.

I have also been busy fencing around a grass field that I have drilled with a herb-rich sward, which is part of my Countryside Stewardship. I will be able to let the cattle graze in the field but will need to remove them for 6 weeks in the Summer to allow the plants to seed.

Thank you to everyone in Easton for their kind wishes and wonderful support to Rob over the last few weeks. (We loved the sign!). Rob had a wonderful time and was thrilled to get to the final.
