I like to use a photograph or two that I have taken to write about, and this month I have seen both the caterpillar and the adult moth of the Buff Tip. The caterpillar is colonial as the eggs are laid as a batch around a stem of sallow or beech or other tree – and they remain together until they are full grown, like this individual. At this stage they can strip a whole branch, and it was this leafless branch along the Spaldwick track that first caught my eye. The

adult moth came to a moth

trap in our garden last month. The ends of its wings mimic a cut stalk. We had another moth trap out this last Sunday which attracted about 40 different kinds of moth, including 300-400 individuals of one called a Setaceous Hebrew character. Setaceous means finely hairy, and as you might guess there is an ordinary (unhairy) Hebrew character as well. This also occurs in our garden, along with a Quaker or two, just to show that we are quite unbiased in our racial and religious Lepidoptery.
