<i>Edward I</i> 20 Nov 1272 - 7 July 1307	Roger Bigod as capital lord was church patron. The rector then had a manse and forty acres of glebe valued at 20 marks.	The rector had a house and a carucate of land valued at 15 shillings.
1275	There is a mention of someone indicted for taking deer at Earsham.	Isabel la Bygot granted Alan Leman, chaplain, 2 acres in Kirby Cane. 1278 John Beverle and Robert Yue of Loddon paid homage to Sir John Bygot for a tenement.
1279	2 nd August: a terrible storm lasting a day and a night causes extensive damage and flooding.	
1283		John Bygod, Lord of Stockton to William Frede, land in Kirby Cane called 'Le Linghilles'. This is presumably the Frede who gave his name to Fredeswode on the parish boundary with Hales. 1286 Sir Richard de Cam died and buried in All Saints' Church.
1286	Sir John Bigot, lord of Stockton, claimed the view of frankpledge, assize and free-warren, since his ancestors had held it from the Abbot of Bury. Under medieval law, each community group, called a tithing, were mutually responsible for law and order, apprehending criminals and giving them up to trial at the local court. Bigod wants to control the tithings, the court and permission to kill game. There was a gallows in the Stockton soke of which Ellingham manor was a part.	
1287		Walter de Cam, was lord in 1287, and did homage to the abbot of Bury in 1303.
1305	Reynold Bolle and Agnes of Ellingham conveyed land in Stockton to Reynold Palmer of Kirby Cane.	
1307 <i>Edward II</i> 8 July 1307 – 20 Jan 1327	The last Bigod, Sir Roger, 5th Earl of Norfolk, died without heirs, and his estates reverted to the Crown. The Earldom was then held by various members of the royal family until 1397, when it was awarded to Thomas Mowbray.	
1312	Edward II made his 12 year old half-brother, Thomas de Brotherton, Earl of Norfolk and Earl Marshall.	Walter de Heckyngham, rector, presented by Walter de Cam. The latter alienated to the rector, who seems to have been Walter Phelip at this time, three acres of land in 1314.
