1435	William Bolton, rector, presented by the King on the minority of John, Duke of Norfolk and later the same year, Robert Fetild.	
1439	William Garneys of Geldeston's will stated that if none of his children had heirs then 1000 marks were to be raised from the manors of Geldeston and Stockton cum soke and spent for the benefit of his soul and those of other named persons, the rest to his wife Elizabeth's heirs (she was Sir Ralph Bigot's daughter). The executors sold the manors to William de la Pole, duke of Suffolk, getting quit claims from any possible heirs.	Robert Gavel died. His son Thomas succeeded.
1444	John de Martlesham of Wainford Mill led a crowd of around 500 persons to demolish the sluices at Ellingham Mill. Wainford Mill seems to have been a fulling mill at the time (one for pounding and stretching woollen cloth).	 <p>Detail from doorway - Kirby Cane Church</p>
1449	Under Henry VI the tax had been reduced to £4.	
1452	Robert Wasselyn, rector, presented by the King (Henry VI).	Robert Hare presented by Thomas Gavel
1457 - 1509	Thomas Gavel left Ellingham, Stiockton, Geldeston, Hales and Kirby Cane to his daughter Thomasine Gavel when she married her second husband, Edward Calthorpe.	
1459	A bequest for a "glass window".	Thomas Gavel, lord of this and Kirkshead died and was buried at door of chapel. Henry inherited.
