1729	Robert Foulkes rector, presented by the Honourable Charles Howard	
1732	John Kirby in his "Suffolk Traveller" reported that the hemp-growing area extended 10 miles in breadth down the valley from Eye to Beccles.  Hemp 	
1734	In her will (1734) Margaret Warren (died 1739) left part of a messuage called the Hall House, with an "arch-roof thereupon".	Sir Charles Turner presented the Rev Samuel Baker (son of Abraham) to the living. Sir Charles' daughter, Jane Turner, married Thomas Archdale of Stanhoe and their daughter and heir, Anne, married John Wilson.
1736		January: His Majesty George II landed at Lowestoft and set out accompanied by locals towards Ipswich. Sir Charles Turner met him at Mutford Bridge with two coaches, and was kindly thanked by His Majesty. Horatio Walpole landed at the same time, but came to spend the night at Kirby Cane Hall and the two set out at 4am the next morning.
