## Mark 9-48: their worm does not die

The SYDROME OF UNAWARENESS: Christ has killed and buried your former transgressions, like worms. How then is it that you have bred others? For sins that harm the souls are more deadly than worms which harm the body. And they make a more offensive stench. Yet we do not even perceive their rankness, and so we sense no urgency to purge them out. So the drunkard fails to recognize how disgusting stale wine is, while one who is sober perceives the difference easily. So with sins: one who lives soberly sees easily the mire and the stain, but the one who gives himself up to wickedness, like one made drowsy with drunkenness, does not even realize that he is ill. This is the worst aspect of evil that it does not allow those who fall into it even to see the seriousness of their own diseased state, but as they lie in the mire, they think they are enjoying perfumes. So they do not have the slightest inclination to free themselves and when full of worms they act like those who pride themselves in precious stones, exulting in them. For this reason they not only have no will to kill them, but they even nourish them and multiply them in themselves, until they send them on to the worms of the age to come. (ST. **From the Archives:** Many of you will now have noticed that the war memorial in our churchyard has been cleaned and restored and that the stone now appears very much as it was when the memorial was erected in 1921. Unfortunately, we have not, yet, been able to clean the crucifix as some time ago it was painted white and this has caused some serious damage to the figure of Christ which is fashioned in concrete. However, we do plan to strip as much of the paint off as we can and then to repaint the figure so that it is not left unprotected. Our thanks must go to the War Memorials Trust who have given the church a grant to cover 75% of the cost of the restoration, but we must now find a further £500 from our own funds. I mentioned some time ago that Preston North End F.C. has donated a 1<sup>st</sup> team signed shirt and a family match ticket to help with the fund raising and I will shortly be announcing how we will use these items to that end.

As part of our commemoration of the centenary of the WW1 armistice, we will be displaying the personal documents of the seven soldiers from Hill Chapel who were killed in that war in an exhibition to be held in church from 15<sup>th</sup> to 20<sup>th</sup> October. It will begin at 7.30pm on Monday, 15<sup>th</sup> when the Whittingham and Goosnargh Heritage Group will visit. A full diary of events will be published shortly but, in the meantime, we are looking to collect artefacts and memorabilia linked to WW1 and to the lives of our soldiers. For example, one man prior to the war was a clog maker, so we would like to borrow a pair of clogs; another was a farmer, another a musician and another a semi-professional footballer. If you have any old articles that we might borrow and use in this exhibition, please let us know as soon as possible. You can do so by contacting Maria Peel, Tom Ibison or myself. Unfortunately, I will be away from 25<sup>th</sup> September until 4<sup>th</sup> October. Many thanks in anticipation of a good response.
