An Easter Reflection



“When it was evening and the doors of the house where the disciples had met were locked for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, ‘Peace be with you.’”

John 20:19

How often have you heard or read those words? Each Easter we remember the time when the disciples were afraid and Jesus came to them with the message of peace.

Each Easter we accept the message as a sign of the reality of the Risen power of Christ. It happened ... the Disciples knew the Saviour’s presence in the midst of their fear, but that wasn’t the end of the story.

Fear can be debilitating, no matter what we are afraid of! The future? Physical pain? The loss of some-one we love? Harsh words? Making a fool of ourselves? Feeling inadequate? The list is endless – but the presence of Christ is not.

This month we will come to the end of the Easter Season. The Ascension (when Jesus ascends to the Father) and Pentecost (when the Holy Spirit fills the church with his presence) lead us rather dramatically into “Ordinary Time”. However, those celebrations also highlight the fact that for those who believe in the Risen Christ, the blessings of Easter-time never end and our relationship with our Saviour is constant.

That visit, on Easter Day to his disciples when they were afraid, was only the first of hundreds of thousands of similar visits to hundreds of thousands of ordinary people over the centuries. For whenever our fear takes over, and all we want to do is to lock ourselves away, (physically, mentally or emotionally) then our Lord comes, (repeatedly if necessary) and says to us *“Peace be with you”*.

We may find it hard to believe – the disciples did – but if we accept his presence then PEACE,

“Not an easy peace,
not an insignificant peace,
not a half hearted peace,
but the PEACE
of the Lord Jesus Christ
is with us”

The fear may remain, but it no longer has the power
to paralyse.

Treasurers Wanted!

Elsewhere in this issue there is a plea from Holy Trinity Church, Gwernaffield, for a Treasurer. It is important to the life of a church that their finances are kept in order; the person who fills the post does not need to be a member of that church, but they will be co-opted onto the church committee.

We also need a Bro Famau Group Treasurer to replace Melanie Langton - Davies, to whom we are extremely grateful for doing it over the last few years, but is increasingly busy with her accountancy practice.

This Treasurer looks after the Bro Famau account which serves the common interests of our five churches. It is not as busy as a church account, but has a critical function in Bro Famau life. We would be grateful for any competent person, whether a member of any of the churches or not, to do it.

If you are interested in knowing more about either of these roles, please could you contact a churchwarden (details on the magazine back cover) or Revd Carole Poolman.

IS THERE A GOD?

I think you would say, yes of course there is, otherwise there would be no point in coming to church. But what or who is God? I once asked a hippy friend who she prayed to, and she said, ‘ Sometimes God, sometimes Osiris.’ Osiris was an Egyptian pagan god, and obviously I rejected that part of her divine image. But in order to respond sensibly to such mistaken ideas, we should be clear about our own image.

The Christian idea of God is a Trinity of Persons, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, separate but one. There is the first difficulty - how can they be three Persons but one God? Trinity Sunday is coming up, on 11th June this year (It falls on the Sunday after Pentecost, which is fifty days after Easter, so it moves each year.) On Trinity Sunday preachers are charged with the traditionally difficult task of explaining the Holy and Blessed Trinity. There are various devices that can be employed; one is St Patrick’s explanation that it is like a clover, with three leaves on one stem; another is the invaluable illustration made by Andre Rublev of three beings sitting round a table which depicts the story of three men coming to Abraham’s camp by the oaks of Mamre. (Genesis 18: 1-15)

The possible problem with these images is that we might think of the Holy Trinity as three beings each with a different job to do in keeping things going. When I worked for Unilever, right at the top of everything there was a group of three people called the Special Committee. Those at my level could not imagine with what mighty tasks they spent their days, but we just knew they controlled the whole business. Is that the way we view the Holy Trinity?

Perhaps we should change the heading to, ‘ Is there a God or Three?’ It is a charge some of other faiths make about Christians, that we worship more than one god. In a connected way, something that used to concern me is that in the Old Testament, we read ‘Lord’ as meaning God the Father, whereas in the New Testament, ‘Lord’ means Jesus. When we pray saying ‘Lord’ whom are we addressing?

When we think about this matter we are inevitably constrained by our human understanding. What happens in the divine sphere is outside our experience, and there is an example from the world of physics.

The electron, a tiny sub-atomic entity, was discovered by J J Thomson in 1896, as a particle. In 1926 Erwin Schrodinger discovered that it also sometimes behaved as a wave (like radio waves, microwaves etc.) Scientific

people of the time were very disturbed, because in their experience things had to be one or the other, it should not be possible to change form according to the circumstances. To make joke out of it a saying went round, God runs the electron as a wave on Monday, Wednesday and Friday, the Devil runs it as a particle on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday, on Sunday it has the day off.

However, they had to accept the evidence of both scientists and broaden their minds to accept that electrons could be understood as both waves and particles.

We have to broaden our minds and say that exactly what God is may be beyond our present understanding.

Each of us probably has our own comprehension of what Father Son and Holy Spirit is, and it would be fascinating to explore what these are, and what different concepts exist in people's minds. They must be formed largely from what we read in the Bible, and particularly the gospels, which are accounts of the ministry of Jesus. There are Christian sects that deny there is a Trinity, and while this term does not appear in the Scriptures (It was invented as a Latin term, *Trinitas*, in Roman Christian times) the phrase Father, Son and Holy Spirit appears in Matthew 28: 19. We therefore need to accept their presence in the divine sphere, and out of our curiosity want to explain their relationship: our shorthand term for the three is the Holy Trinity.

The most revealing of the gospels about the nature of Jesus to my thinking is that of St. John. John was chosen and followed Jesus as a disciple, saw what he did and experienced the miraculous event of the Resurrection while he was still quite a young man. He went out as an apostle, evangelising, baptising and lived on until old age. If, as many scholars believe, he was the author of the Book of the Revelation to St John, he also received visions of divine mysteries. Towards the end of his life, possibly at Ephesus, having read the gospels of Mark, Matthew and Luke, he was dissatisfied that they did not portray Jesus in his true light, so he wrote his own. It is agreed by scholars that it was written close to the end of the first century AD.

I believe the key passage to the purpose of St John's gospel is 14: 7-14. Jesus tells his disciples they know the Father and have seen him. Philip questions this and Jesus firmly says that in seeing him they have seen the Father, ending his statement with, 'Believe me that I am in the Father and the Father is in me;'

He recognises that it might be outside their comprehension (and ours!) and offers an alternative proof: ‘ but if you do not (believe me) then believe me because of the works themselves.’

These are the ‘seven signs’, miracles performed by Jesus and related by John as the alternative proof of Jesus’ divinity.

They are: the wedding at Cana in Galilee (2: 1-11), healing the royal official’s son (4: 46-54), healing the paralysed man (5: 1-18), feeding the five thousand (6: 1-14), walking on water (6: 16-21), healing the blind man (9: 1-12) and finally raising Lazarus (11: 1-44.)

This is the alternative narrative that shows Jesus is divine; the more basic one pointing towards the same conclusion is throughout the gospel; while he was in the world, sent by but in communion with God he was the Son, but ascended he is God.

It starts in the beginning of the book with the resounding passage we read at Christmas, John 1: 1-14. This places Jesus at the Creation and is modelled on the first words in the Bible in the book of Genesis. Jesus is the Word, and at the end of the first verse it states ‘ the Word was God.’

There are indications throughout his gospel, other than the signs, pointing to his sameness with God. For example in John 2: 19 he says, ‘ Destroy this temple and in three days I will raise it up.’ (referring to his body as a temple)

In John 8: 58 Jesus says, ‘ Very truly I tell you, before Abraham was, I am.’ I AM is what God told Moses is his name in Exodus 3: 14.

There are many other passages, referring to his time on earth, when he is called the Son of God, or the Son of Man as though by descending he has taken a step down. This is the only way I can explain it with my poor human mind - you must decide for yourself.

God has made us curious, and this is what enables our minds to be lifted towards his, and our being above that of animals. But we cannot know it all at once (John 16:12) So we should be at peace with what we do understand about the Holy and Blessed Trinity and leave the rest for a more enlightened day.

Letter from Ysgol Nannerch

Ysgol Nannerch has had strong links with St. Michael and All Angels Church for many years. Incumbents have always come into school to meet children and take assemblies. David Wright currently comes into school once a week to lead the Act of Worship, and has done so for many years. Rev. Brian Harvey enthusiastically carried the service on and in the next interregnum it was continued to the present date by Ken Benison and David Wright. It is always a joy to see so many families attend church for this service with the children contacting David beforehand to volunteer to read and lead prayers. They are very enthusiastic!

We (the School and Mothers' Union) aim to celebrate Pentecost this year with an interactive, multi - sensory experience in church to engage the children imaginatively with the events surrounding the festival.

We are very grateful that forging these important links and reinforcing the children's knowledge and faith is only possible because the school community is so supportive. We promote and strengthen the Christian ethic in school. Thanks too, for the continuing help and funding of Mothers' Union.

St RICHARD of CHICHESTER

St Richard of Chichester, who lived from 1197 to 1253, is patron saint of the English county of Sussex.

In 1244 Richard was elected Bishop of Chichester but King Henry III wanted someone else as bishop and he ordered that no one should feed or house Richard. So Richard lived with a friend who was a parish priest and visited his entire diocese on foot for two years until the king relented.

Richard is widely remembered today for the prayer he is supposed to have said as he was dying. The prayer was adapted for the song 'Day by Day' in the musical Godspell and it is in this form that most people know it today:

Day by day,
Dear Lord, of thee
three things I pray:
To see thee more clearly,
Love thee more dearly,
Follow thee more nearly,
Day by Day.





Mothers' Union become Dementia Friends

Dementia is a devastating disease and one we are told in the news, is set to be a major killer in the 21st century. The Alzheimer's Society's Dementia Friends programme is the biggest ever initiative to change people's perceptions of dementia. It aims to transform the way the nation thinks, talks and acts about the condition.

Dementia Friends tackles the stigma and lack of understanding that means many people with the condition experience loneliness and social exclusion. With this in mind we invited Caroline, a local Dementia Champion to talk to us in our April meeting.

A Dementia Friends Champion is a volunteer who encourages others to make a positive difference to people living with dementia in their community. They do this by giving them information about the personal impact of dementia, and what they can do to help.

It was such an informative and eye-opening session, listening to Caroline tell stories and taking part in activities to help deepen our understanding of how this disease affects those it strikes..

After her session we were invited to make a pledge as part of our responsibility as newly appointed Dementia Friends, from telling friends about Dementia Friends to visiting someone we know living with dementia.

SUNDAY BIBLE READINGS PREVIEWED

Please use these introductions to prepare for worship. If you are a reader at home who is unable to come to church, you might like to use these pages, with your Bible, to join the congregation on a Sunday in the reading of the same passages.

Sunday 4th June - Pentecost - service of installation of Revd Daniel Stroud at St Mary's Cilcain

Acts 2: 1-21 In Jerusalem, many pilgrims had come for the great Pentecost Harvest Festival. As Jesus had promised, the Holy Spirit of God came upon the gathered company of disciples with great power. They found themselves impelled to proclaim the resurrection gospel to everyone who would listen.

Or,

Numbers 11: 24-30 When Moses could no longer carry the burden of leadership alone, the gift of the Spirit was granted to seventy of the Israelite elders, to share god's work on the journey to the Promised Land. Even those not present at this event received an equal measure of the Spirit's inspiration.

1 Corinthians 12: 3-13 Paul explains something of the Holy Spirit's work in our lives: he is active everywhere, inspiring different gifts in different people. All should work together in the unity of the Church which is now Christ's body on earth.

John 20: 19-23 John's gospel is unique in speaking of the gift of the Holy Spirit before the events of Pentecost. Here, Jesus appears to his friends in a locked room on the evening of the first Easter. He gives them his peace, a breath of the Holy Spirit and a commission to pronounce forgiveness of sins.

Or

John 7: 37-39 The Holy Spirit is compared by Jesus to the life-giving water he said could be found in him. When he has been glorified, his Spirit will be freely given to all believers.

Sunday 11th June - Trinity Sunday

Isaiah 40: 12-17, 27-31 The prophet reminds us that we cannot expect fully to understand the mystery which lies at the heart of God. The Israelite's faith was shaken by their enforced exile to Babylon, but here is assurance that at the heart of God is self-giving love; he does not grow faint or weary, and all who trust in him will find their strength renewed.

2 Corinthians 13: 11-13 Paul ends this letter with the full form of his customary blessing. These simple trinitarian words, of grace, love and communion have been familiar in every church in every century.

Matthew 28: 16-20 Matthew ends his gospel with the promise that Christ is always with us. The disciples are commissioned to carry Christ's own redeeming love, to make new disciples, and baptise them as the Church has done ever since, in the name of Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

Sunday 18th June - First after Trinity

Exodus 19: 2-8 The people of Israel, journeying towards their Promised Land, have reached Mount Sinai. Moses has just appointed men to share the task God gave him, as we will hear Jesus do. This passage is a summary of the commissioning from God of those Israelite elders.

Romans 5: 1-8 Paul has been explaining how it was Abraham's faith, not his actions, that set him right with God. The Christian faith similarly brings us peace, hope, grace and joy in our union with Jesus. Amazingly, Jesus has died for the sake of sinful people.

Matthew 9: 35 - 10: 8 [9-23] There are too many people demanding to hear Jesus, and to be healed by him. So he commissions twelve others to share this labour, to work in his name with authority and power, bringing in the kingdom.

Sunday 25th June - Second after Trinity

Jeremiah 20: 7-13 Jeremiah has been subjected to punishment for preaching what he felt compelled to say. So he complains to God who forced him into the situation, while still affirming his trust. Jesus will tell his chosen twelve that the disciples' task will not make them popular.

Romans 6: 1-11 Because Jesus came and died, Paul has written, our faith brings God's grace to us. We receive that grace first in our baptism, then by a life in which all sin is conquered - a new quality of life, in Christ and with him.

Matthew 10: 24-39 Jesus is speaking to the twelve he has chosen to work closely with him. Matthew here puts together here several rather contradictory sayings of Jesus about the difficulties of apostolic vocation, alongside its delights. So we hear both warning and encouragement for our own discipleship.

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
