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

Prepare the Way!

It always starts slowly, though it seems to happen a little earlier each year. There's a red ribbon here, a glimpse of garland there, then you wake up one morning and suddenly the houses are all decked out, the radio is playing "All I want for Christmas is You" on repeat, and the Christmas advertisements come at you at an alarming rate. Yes, the Christmas season is nearly upon us, and with it come all the attendant pressures to get the decorations correct, to throw the perfect party, to not disappoint your secret Santa, to get just the right gift for that special someone, to pick out a perfectly shaped tree, and on and on and on. When I hear the carols talking about angels singing "Peace on Earth," I can't help that it means not only an end to conflict, but relief from the madness of the holiday season! It can be hard to find a moment of quiet in the midst of the madness.

The church doesn't fly headlong into Christmas, however. We're about to begin the season of Advent, a season of waiting and preparation. Though we celebrate Christmas for 12 days, beginning on Christmas day and going until Epiphany on the 6th of January, during December we're called to slow down, be still, wait quietly, and prepare the way for Christ. And that preparation is both internal and external. We're called to prepare our own hearts by finding some quiet and reflecting on ways we can be more gentle, loving, kind, and peaceful. We're also called to, like John the Baptist, prepare the world for the Kingdom of God by making the world a more just, compassionate, and equitable place. Christmas isn't just about presents, it's about the miracle that God came to earth to bring us out of the darkness and into the light; what better time to walk further down that path than as we prepare to celebrate that miracle!

There are many ways we can do this, making and lighting an advent wreath, being intentional about praying together before meals, waiting a bit longer than you would to put up Christmas decorations, and most importantly, visiting the church to pray and spend time with God whose birth we are to celebrate, either for a service or on your own when its open and quiet. However you undertake your preparations, you're always welcome at the church, and we wish you a blessed and peaceful Advent!

THE KINGDOM SEASON

Throughout November, from All Saints to Advent, we celebrate the Kingdom Season, culminating with the festival of Christ the King on the last Sunday of November.

The Church in Wales has the Kingdom Season in our calendar, whereas in the Church of England, other Anglican Provinces, the Roman Catholic Church and the Methodist Church have only Christ the King as an official festival. It was moved by Pope Paul VI from the last Sunday in October, and some Catholics still celebrate it then.

Whatever the official recognition, the Sunday readings, which are the same in all the Churches named above, point towards the Day of the Lord and the Kingdom of God. These are the last four Sundays of the Church Year, so it is

right that we should think and pray about the last things, before we start with the new liturgical year at Advent.

The beginning of our journey with the human Person of God came at Advent, and the fulfilment will come with the Day of the Lord. Then the rule of Jesus as King of the Universe will become tangible and the Kingdom of God will have arrived in its glory. God is present in all time so if we have faith we can celebrate what is yet to come. The Kingdom Season looks forward in the faith we have in Christ to bring about our final deliverance from the grip of sin and so to a better time when he will rule absolutely.

There were earlier beginnings, when God spoke to Abraham, and when God created the world. There has probably always been a belief amongst humankind that a better time would come eventually, the spirit that keeps hope alive. References to the Day are found throughout the Old and New Testaments, in the Christian era of course focussing upon Christ as the Saviour of the world. My favourite, because it was written in a time of terrible persecution of Christians, is Mark 13:26,27:

‘ Then they will see the Son of Man coming in clouds with great power and glory. Then he will send out the angels, and gather in his elect from the four winds, from the ends of the earth to the ends of heaven.’

This is the final reality of our existence, when Christ’s rule will become evident to all people. I pray that our faith will become sure and sound during the Kingdom Season.


St HUGH of LINCOLN 17th November

In the Middle Ages, bishops were very important people. They were not only men of the church but also involved in running the country. They lived in great palaces and did not have much to do with ordinary people.

Bishop Hugh of Lincoln was different. He became known and loved for his charity to the poor; he cared for lepers and even risked his own life to prevent the killing of Jewish people during riots.

The Bishop rebuilt Lincoln Cathedral after it was destroyed by a great earthquake in 1185, but to him people were always more important than all the carved stones.

WORD SEARCH ON ST ANDREW (FEAST DAY 30TH NOVEMBER)

St Andrew is the patron saint of Scotland, though his only connection with the country is that some of his bones were reputedly transported in the 8th century to Fife and preserved at a church in a place now named St Andrews. Andrew was one of the first disciples of Jesus, and the very first to bring someone else to Christ - his own brother. Like many fervent Jews at the time Andrew and an unnamed companion had been drawn to the prophet John the Baptist. When one day John pointed out Jesus to Andrew and his friend, and described him as the 'Lamb of God', the two young men assumed that the next stage of their spiritual search was about to unfold. So as Jesus made off, they followed him.

When Jesus turned and asked them what they were 'seeking', all they could come up with was a lame enquiry about his current place of residence: 'where are you staying?'

The reply of Jesus was the most straight-forward invitation anyone can receive: 'Come and see'. So they did, and the results of their response were life-changing. For Andrew brought his brother, Peter, to Jesus, and soon the little apostolic band who would carry the message of Jesus to the whole world was formed. And right at the front of the column, as it were, was Andrew, the first disciple of Jesus.

Christmas Tree Festival.



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SUNDAY BIBLE READINGS PREVIEWED

Please use these introductions to prepare for worship. If you are a reader at home who is unable to come to church, you might like to use these pages, with your Bible, to join the congregation on a Sunday in the reading of the same passages

Sunday 5th November - First Sunday of the Kingdom, All Saints Sunday

Revelation 7:9-17 Instead of an Old Testament reading this All Saints Sunday, we hear one of the seven visions given to John. He tells of the vast number of holy men and women who served God faithfully in their lifetime and now surround the heavenly throne of glory.

1 John 3:1-3 We do not know what our life after death will be like. Our faith is that we will see and know completely the Christ whom we follow here, and so we will be like him.

Matthew 5:1-12 In these strange paradoxes we call the Beatitudes, Jesus teaches us who are the holy people in God's sight, those who will find his blessings as his kingdom comes.

Sunday 12th November - Remembrance Sunday, Second Sunday of the Kingdom

There are no prescribed readings on the theme of Remembrance, so the preacher may choose their own, or those below.

Wisdom 6:12-16 To religious thinkers of the last century before Christ, wisdom seemed more than just an attribute of God - she was a person of God. This short passage comes from a long section in our Apocrypha, of praise to wisdom and injunctions to seek her.

OR,

Amos 5:18-24 In Israel in the 8th century BC, Amos sees more attention being given to religious ritual than to social justice. So, says this fierce prophet, if you expect the Lord's coming, beware that it may not be as delightful as you think. When God comes to his world he comes in righteous judgement.

1 Thessalonians 4:13-18 This letter is the earliest we have from Paul. The church at that time expected Jesus to return very soon. Paul has encouraging words for those who might die before that second Advent, because every one of us can look forward to life with Christ for ever.

Matthew 25:1-13 Jesus tells a parable about the coming Day of the Son of Man. None of us can know the time of his coming, but we must live as though it might be at any moment, and be prepared to face him.

Sunday 19th November - Third Sunday of the Kingdom

Zephaniah 1:7, 12-18 The Bible has much to say about the anticipated 'Day of the Lord.' For this prophet in the seventh century BC, it would be a time for God to root out all corruption; he will destroy and punish in a sudden outburst of his righteous judgement.

1 Thessalonians 5:1-11 In this early letter Paul still expected Jesus to return soon and draw all things to an end. He asks the Christians to live with that sense of expectancy, in confidence that the faithful will be taken into the Lord's company when he comes to complete our salvation.

Matthew 25:14-30 Matthew tells another of Jesus' parables about the Day of the Lord. Then, the fulness of the kingdom of heaven will reveal what each person made of the gifts God gave on trust. It is the parable of the talents, and the joy in store for those who are faithful stewards.

Sunday 26th November - Christ the King

Ezekiel 34:11-16, 20-24 David had been the great Shepherd-King, and the Jews longed for another like him.

Today's gospel will pick up the thought of the king as shepherd. We hear first from Ezekiel, preparing for a divine intervention into history, speaking of God himself as the gatherer of his flock into safety, under a worthy successor to David.

Ephesians 1:15-23 Paul's great hymn of prayer and praise extols the power of God at work in all the faithful, and the Lord Jesus Christ raised up as King over all things.

Matthew 25:31-46 Jesus speaks about the end of time, and the kingly power that will be seen in the coming of the Son of Man. He reveals what the standard of judgement will be for entry into this kingdom - either we did, or did not, care for him as we find him to be in the needy.

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
