News of 'The Friends' launch will be available on the web site. We are all very grateful indeed to Michael, Maurice and Malcolm for their hard work and for their commitment to help the church through a very difficult period.

The launch of The Friends introduces a new dimension to the church. people can now choose two different financial routes. Money received via service collections and fees goes towards the running costs, such as insurance, oil, electricity, water, share of Vicar's expenses, Parish Share to the Diocese, fire extinguisher servicing wafers, candles, communion wines and minor repairs etc. These bills could not be covered without the various fund-raising events and donations from individuals from sales of craft work and so on. Funds donated to 'The Friends' will pay for repairs to the fabric of the church as detailed in the literature - to ensure that the Historic Listed Building and permanent fixtures are preserved for the future. There are two separate banks accounts in which to deposit funds, so please decide which account (or both!) you wish to contribute to and ask Vicar Michael or any PCC member for bank details. Matters raised at the public meeting back in September are ongoing and although progress appears to be very slow I would like to assure everyone that a great deal of work has been, and is being, done not only by those in charge, but also by others within the church community' could I ask everyone who paid cheques into the collection {regularly or if just visiting or as a donation, from April 2014 to March 2015 to make a list of the dates and amount and pass it on to me or Michael. This could be very helpful.

Please ask yourself (but not if you're already doing lots of jobs, for the church!), if you could help - a church warden and a Treasurer are still desperately needed - the Diocese requires that these posts are filled. There are suitable people in and around the parish - we just need them to volunteer ... or perhaps a knock on the door is all that is needed! Practical help with cleaning, churchyard tidying minor repairs etc. is always much appreciated.

The Burn's Night celebration takes place on Friday January 29th in the Parish Hall at 7 pm. See the poster for details and get your tickets for friends and family now! Gillian and her team have prepared a list of food and drinks and other items such as napkins, paper plates that are needed. Raffle prizes would be much appreciates as would any Scottish themed Tombola Prizes.

The few who have attended the new 4 pm service once a month have found themselves rather lonely due to the low turnout. Those who have commitments with children dependents or elderly and are unable to get to church at 9 am, (made all the more difficult in Esh in winter time with ice or snowfalls), appreciate the opportunity to join the congregation, but find themselves in a virtually empty church. If you enjoy a Sunday morning, lie-in, then the once-amonth 4 pm service is for you too! The PCC will keep reviewing the services and it may prove sensible to hold just a 4 pm service, rather than two services one Sunday a month, ensuring that everyone has the opportunity to come together for Evening Prayer, Evensong or Eucharist. Check the diary at the back of the magazine for the next 4 pm service, come along and let Michael know what you think.

Many will have learned of the death of our former neighbour, the church's good friend Bunty Whitfield in November. Bunty left hospital and spent three weeks recuperating at Shotley Bridge then went to a Residential Home in Durham. Upon return from holiday I picked up 'phone messages from Buntys daughter Jill keeping me informed. Unfortunately very few of Bunty's Esh friends were aware of the sad news until after the funeral. Bunty and her late husband Bobby enjoyed a few very happy years together in Esh, relishing the views from their bungalow and enjoying life within the community. Bunty, a former nurse and GP's wife, was full of sound common sense, with a wonderful sense of fun and good humour, always interested in people and hearing their news. Although frailty prevented her attending services she was a most generous supporter of the church and loved returning to Esh with Jill for coffee Mornings. She often recalled her staunch, no nonsense Presbyterian upbringing' we will remember Bunty with great affection and send our sincere condolences to her daughters Jill and Alison and their families.

We also send our condolences to Carole and Maurice Sewell and all their family following the loss of Carole's mother in December. Please remember both families in your prayers.

Good wishes are sent to Vanessa and Malcolm who seemed not to let surgery slow them down in any way; to former neighbour Mary Pearce who unfortunately has had post-op difficulties; to lay reader Tony who is recovering from recent surgery; to Margaret and Denis O'Conelley and to Audrey Wilkinson.
