






Refill: A New Scheme to Reduce Single Use Plastic Bottles

Ashford Borough Council are supporting a new nationwide scheme to encourage people to refill their reusable water bottles on the go rather than buy a new bottle of water, therefore helping to reduce plastic waste. Over 40 businesses have already signed up in the Ashford area alone, including our very own Wheel Inn and Hare and Hounds! The Halfway House at Challock, Vision Hair and Beauty in Eurka Cafe and The Pheasant pub are also on board, as are four pubs in Wye, The Swan at Little Chart, Black Horse at Pluckley, and many cafes in central Ashford. ABC has also installed a free water bottle refill fountain in Park Mall.

Wherever you see a business displaying the sticker below, you know your request for a refill will be well received, and you can also download the Refill App onto your phone which will show you the location of your nearest Refill station anywhere in the country! Howard Preston

Tuesday July 9th was another sad goodbye day. Howard Preston's friends and former colleagues and neighbours in Sandyhurst Lane gathered with his family at St Mary Westwell to say goodbye, but also to celebrate a notable life lived to the full.

Howard was born in Southwark, and like so many London families was evacuated to the west country at the start of the war in 1939, first to Shepton Mallet then Kentisbury in North Devon. A bout of tonsillitis saved his life — Howard was due to travel to Canada on the City of Benares — the children's evacuee ship that was sunk by a German submarine torpedo in 1940.

Schooling in North Devon went well – Howard went on to read organic chemistry at Southampton university. Life was fun too: Howard loved raising money for the University's RAG, and once confronted Stanley Matthews dressed as a gorilla. He tried cricket, opting to umpire after a ball broke his nose. In 1956 his national service was with the RAF as an air radar fitter. His career started at ICI Welwyn but soon moved to Unilever who operated on the same site. In 1967 Howard moved to Unilever's Food Industries on the Wirral where he met Janet Lloyd. By 1968 they were renovating a cottage in Willaston and Claire arrived 9 years later. In 1982 Food flavour work brought the family to Ashford, he was expert at GLC; PPF's merger with Naarden took them for a while to Holland in 1988.

Howard was as passionate about his community as he was about chemistry. He was a founder member and a long time chairman of the Sandyhurst Lane Residents Association. Friends remember him for his assiduous study and commentary on planning applications. Howard loved his garden and his prize rhododendrons and azaleas. His tall stooping charm and that beguiling smile and manner of a slightly absent-minded professor was Howard Preston's hallmark. Janet and Howard celebrated their Golden Wedding in 2018. Howard will be missed by all his friends in Sandyhurst Lane and Westwell.

A20 News

Monday 22nd July a new traffic order came into effect limiting speeds on the A20 to 50 mph between the Hothfield Station Rd - Westwell Watery lane junction and the bridge over the M20 by the Holiday Inn. As at the end of July the 50mph signs have not yet been installed. The order is not effective until the signs are up.

The reason for the speed restriction is a combination of accumulated accident statistics along this section of the A20 – which makes it a "safety action hotspot"- and a recent request by Hothfield parish council for speed survey work to be done at Tutt Hill at the Chapel road junction. It is the combined results of this data that led KCC Highways to progress a traffic order reducing the speed along this stretch from 60 to 50.

On Monday 15th July the overnight no waiting restrictions for HGV's came into effect permanently along the A20 between Drovers and Charing roundabouts. This is combined with ABC being able to clamp vehicles that do not observe the no waiting restrictions. HGVs are allowed to stop along the roads in safe places during the day. The restriction is for 8pm to 7am. There are similar restrictions on 4 of the industrial estates in Ashford. The HGV's are encouraged to use the Ashford international Truck stop at Waterbrook which has an additional 200 spaces and is a 5 star facility.

This is better working conditions for truck drivers and a better road safety, and less air, noise and environmental pollution for residents.

Westwell Community Watch Scheme

Keeping you Safe and Secure Neighbourhood Watch

One of our Neighbourhood Watch Police Volunteers, Steve Bartlett, no relation, has advised us that, in the last month alone, there have s been over 20 REPORTED incidents of criminal damage across the borough. These range in severity from a broken window from a ball bearing fired from a catapult ,to plastic tables being broken and hose left on resulting in flooding of the Bowls Green on Tenterden Recreation Ground. However trivial every one of these incidents is distressing to the property owner and cause them cost and disruption. I am sure we all fondly remember the excitement of fine weather, light evenings and the lack of pressure of school the next day,

but I like to think this was never an excuse for mindless vandalism. Neither is it now for the vast majority of our youngsters who have just ended a trying year at school and have six to eight weeks to relax. However sadly there is a small, irresponsible minority, for whom damaging other people's property is fun and how they get their kicks.

Fortunately so far none in Westwell!.

We cannot be complacent though!!

If you see something be careful about getting involved. Try and get some video and report it through 999 if it is still going on but 101 if it's all over.

The video will still be useful in identifying the perpetrators.

Closer to home the SLRA Committee have been getting fake emails purported to come from me, as Chair, asking for "help" They are sent from a false, but apparently recognisable, email address stating I am "busy" and need their urgent help. This normally comprises getting them to buy something like store or Itune gift cards and sending me (at the fake email address) the activation details. No-one's email account has been hacked but the names etc have been harvested from public domain websites. On these occasions the scam has failed as the recipients know we do not use my title "Chair" in our internal emails.

But this scam, and others like it, means you should always check with the supposed sender by a known secure method before responding to any such unexpected requests for "help".

Sad, but that is the world we live in!

Letter to the Parishes

Our recent theme of talks at Cornerstone has been on Community. Each week we have been considering the following:- A community who cares for each other, a community who worships together, a community who serves together and a community who prays together. I would like to think about what we mean by Community.

To begin with a community is a group of people who mutually support each other. In the words of the Book of Common Prayer relating to marriage '...for the mutual society, help and comfort that the one ought to have of the other...'

The first part of this is to get to know each other so that we can get past the conventional answer to the question "How are you?" of "I'm fine." and really understand whether someone really is 'fine'. This also means that we have to feel safe with each other and be able to trust and be trusted.

Worshipping and praying together are probably specific to church or other religious communities and we clearly need to care for each other and serve each other within that community. But our worship and prayer within that church community should equip and inspire us to reach out to care for and serve our wider communities. Words alone are not enough. Jesus showed us that we must serve each other by washing his disciples' feet.

James in his letter asks the questions

'What good is it, my brothers and sisters, if you say you have faith but do not have works? Can faith save you? If a brother or sister is naked and lacks daily food and one of you says to them, "Go in peace; keep warm and eat your fill", and yet you do not supply their bodily needs, what is the good of that?'

We at Cornerstone are thinking how we can be not just 'Sunday Christians' but be a real part of the communities in which we live, to reach out and serve them.

So the question which I ask you as worshipping communities but also as individuals is: How can you serve your community?

I would be very happy to hear any ideas which you might come up with.

Parish Council

The Parish Council met in the parish hall on Monday July 1st. Larry Krause (borough councillor) was present and reported on proposals to make the overnight lorry parking ban permanent and to reduce the speed limit on the A20 between Tutt Hill and Watery Lane. In addition to his responsibilities on a number of Borough Council committees, Larry Krause is also a Trustee of Sandy Acres Sports Club in Sandyhurst Lane; he felt that a Westwell parish councillor from the Sandyhurst Lane area should be invited to take up a Trustee's role.

With a minor correction the Minutes of the May meeting were agreed and Matters Arising taken, these included works to the hedge in the Garden of Remembrance and the future of the Playing Field Association (more properly called the Playing Field and Young Persons' Association).

No planning applications had been received. Other planning matters discussed included the delay in deciding a planning application at Park House Farm; Openreach's postponement of moving the telegraph pole by the Wheel, which is delaying the development on the former pub garden; the Oakover planning application was to be discussed at the Borough Council Planning Committee on 3rd July, the Parish Council would speak at the meeting in support of the application but would ask for conditions re traffic; the failure to remove second caravan from the travellers' site in Watery Lane as required. The Parish Council's submissions on the following consultations were ratified, the deadline for submission being before the meeting: Boughton Aluph and Eastwell Neighbourhood Plan consultation; overnight lorry parking ban; speed limit reduction on the A20.

Parish Council finances were discussed including ongoing works: The hall access track will be repaired after the Players' storage container has been moved onto the field; a site meeting will be arranged re the proposed pedestrian access onto Westwell Lane from the playing field; the noticeboard outside The Old Vicarage is in need of repair/replacement. A financial report on the Westwell Eye was given. The annual survey of trees on Parish Council-owned/maintained land revealed the need for minor works to a number of trees in the churchyard; a quote from Blean Tree Care was accepted.

It was agreed to set up a Parish Council email account for use by councillors and the Clerk for Parish Council business. The Parish Council's Risk Register was updated and agreed. A request for Parish Council-organised litter picks in Sandyhurst Lane was declined on safety grounds. Reports from Parish Council representatives were received, including the Kent Association of Local Councils, Action with Communities in Rural Kent, the Hall Management Committee, the Playing Field and Young Persons' Association. No improvement has been reported in broadband provision, this will be raised at the next meeting of the Kent Association of Local Councils. The meeting ended after Any Other Business. The next Parish Council meeting will be held on Monday 2nd September at 7pm in the parish hall.



Step in to Hothfield's History 7th/8th September, St Margaret's Church

Immerse yourself in an exhibition of Hothfield's memories in and around our beautiful 13th century church. Admire the colourful Tufton tomb and learn about the Lords who owned the estate and built the manor houses. Parish Hall Loos

The twinning of the Parish Hall toilets through the charity Toilet Twinning is now complete. Graham Hutchinson, organiser of the Classic Car show, has donated £60 to twin the accessible toilet with a latrine in NamSheKaw, Ptao, Kachin State, Myanmar, This gives families in a very poor area access to a basic toilet, clean water and education about hygiene – a vital combination that saves lives. Having a toilet close to the house makes families feel safer, especially the women and girls who are at risk of attack when having to go out into the bush.

The three framed certificates with a photo of the twinned overseas toilets and their GPS coordinates will be hung in the Village Hall. This village has now geneously donated £180 towards the life-saving trio of toilets, taps and training through twinning the village hall loos. August on Hothfield Heathlands

The spangle of midsummer flowers across the heathland gives way in August to the glory of the heather or ling, Calluna vulgaris. Flowering had started in July but August will be the peak, sheeting the open slopes in purple pink. The tiny flowers consist of four petals and four petallike sepals which seem surprisingly flimsy for such a tough wiry survivor of a plant. The energy the plant manages to draw from poor nutrients and - certainly this year - abundant sunshine is put into producing nectar and pollen to attract the bee species and other insects essential for pollination and prolific production of seed assuring future generations of the plant. The flowers wither and remain on the stem often until the next flowering season, long after seed dispersal. The botanical survey that concluded on 25 July records seedling and developing heather in many areas of the heathland, which is good news. The name ling comes from the Anglo-Saxon word *lig* for fire, as heather was an important fuel.

The regular survey team of volunteers led by Ian Rickards or Christina Juan was helped by occasional volunteers including a trio of university students from Canterbury following up their personal interest in conservation and wild flowers. It has been hard work at times, struggling through or around thickets of bracken, gorse and bramble over our heads, or trying to keep dry stepping from one sedge tussock to another in the lower fen, not always successfully, but extremely satisfying, and a constant learning curve. The mewing of buzzards was an occasional accompaniment, the myriad of insects, butterflies and moths a constant delight, and close-up encounters with the specialised bog plants such as the mini-meadows of pink bog pimpernel a privilege. Someone is now patiently entering all the information from the botanical surveys onto the KWT database for analysis and use by the warden planning future management of the site. Meanwhile other volunteers are monitoring the dragonflies and demoiselles across the heathland, with keeled skimmer, emperor, banded demoiselle, four-spot chaser and broad-bodied chaser recorded so far, their names reflecting their aggressive approach to life.

Another tiny August delight is the flowering of the insectivorous sundews (Drosera rotundifolia) in the upper bog. Slender stems rise several inches above the reddish rosettes of sticky leaves, each stem bearing a spike of tight round bud opening to small white flowers. There are several colonies easily seen close to the causeway across the bog. Drosera, from the Greek *droseros*, alludes to the dewy look of the leaves covered in glands tipped with a globule of shining liquid used to deceive insects into landing on the leaf instead of on genuine water.

Hothfield Heathland is open to everyone; trails are signposted and marked on entrance maps, along with the location of livestock. The noticeboard down the main slope from the Cades Road car park gives recent wildlife sightings. Please keep dogs in check, especially around children and livestock, and keep them away from the heather and undergrowth where they will disturb sensitive wildlife.
