
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1st Charing Scout Group



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Parish Council

The Parish Council met in the hall on Monday 3rd July. The Open Session included concerns with regard to the revised draft of the Local Plan, and in particular the renaming of the 'Woodside' site (near the Hare and Hounds) as 'Land east of Hothfield Mill, A20'. It was thought that residents' attention should be drawn to this change and help in drafting and distributing a leaflet was offered.

Councillor Miss Davidson had written to the Chairman resigning from the Parish Council for health reasons. This was received with regret and Miss Davidson thanked for her service to the community while on the Parish Council. Notices of the vacancy will be put on the noticeboards, and if no poll is triggered by residents, the Parish Council will co-opt to fill the vacancy.

Larry Krause (borough councillor) attended and gave his report, noting that the decision on a previously permitted planning application at Tutt Hill House would likely remain unchanged for a current application, notwithstanding the Parish Council's objection, unless there had been a significant change in circumstances. Member grants were offered to the Hall Management Committee and Westwell Players towards purchase of new chairs and a storage facility, respectively. Minutes of the May and June meetings were approved, there were no Matters Arising. The Financial report was approved. Two planning applications were discussed, one was supported but further information sought on the second.

The latest draft of the Local Plan was discussed; there are two new sites in the parish in the revised Plan: 75 dwellings on land to the east of Hothfield Mill (previously known as the Woodside site), and 75 dwellings on land at Tutt Hill. The consultation runs until 31st August and the Parish Council will be submitting substantial responses on both sites. Residents need to comment too. A drop-in session to inform residents would be arranged in the parish hall on July 16th, and there would be further opportunities to look at the proposals at exhibitions being held by the Borough Council.

Shadoxhurst Parish Council is writing to the Housing Minister expressing concerns at national planning policy and in particular its impact on the rural areas; it is seeking support from parishes in the borough for the letter. It was agreed that Westwell Parish Council supports the letter.

The Westwell Players asked the Parish Council for permission to place a shipping container (suitably painted and screened) on the playing field, to store Players' costumes and equipment. The request will also be put to the Hall Committee and Playing Field Association, because they will also be affected.

The Parish Council had received a request to plant a Christmas tree on the church green, this will be followed-up but the correct choice of variety was stressed.

There is a need for the Parish Council to have a safeguarding policy in place; a draft policy was circulated and a recommendation will be prepared by Councillor Mrs Wyatt.

Reports were taken from Parish Council representatives: a meeting will be held with Highways on 17th July to discuss lorry parking and abandoned trailers; the Playing Field Association is organising a fun day on 23rd July; the annual tree survey was carried out by the Parish Council's tree wardens; the suitability of the matting underneath the playing field equipment was queried, the present matting is inspected annually by RoSPA. The meeting closed after Any Other business.

The next meeting is on 4th Monday September at 7pm in the parish hall. All meetings are open to the public and all are welcome.

News on the Ashford Local Plan.

There is still time to find out about the latest draft of the Local Plan and to comment. There will be display of what is proposed at the Westwell Fete on August 27th . The deadline for comments is August 31st. There will also be a drop-in sessions to get help submitting your comments. Upstairs at the Hare & Hounds pub : mid August date to be confirmed: contact the parish clerk , Sue Wood on 627087 or ask at the H&H. Also a session during the last week of August in the Parish hall. Details will be on Westwell Facebook and sent round on Westwell Events email.

Thanks to everyone who visited the drop in session in Westwell parish hall on July 16th or 23rd or who got along to the Borough Council event in Hothfield village hall on July 21st . Contact Sue Wood if you need a consultation response form, or you can post comments on line. Getting comments in by the August 31st deadline will ensure ABC listen to views from Westwell.

What is proposed in Westwell parish?

Two sites each of 75 houses accessed from the A20 into areas that are currently fields growing crops. One is east of Hothfield Mill. This is a modification of the site that was previously submitted as "Woodside". It was not included in the Plan then because there are better alternatives, and the Ashford 's housing target was lower. Although the access is improved the Local plan documents do admit that development on this site would break the western rural boundary of Ashford, this is also part of the wildlife corridor between the Warren and Hothfield Common. The other 75 houses for the parish are proposed in a field at Tutt Hill: between the Premier Inn and the Banyan Retreat. The Tutt Hill site is opposite another site being suggested for 150 houses on the Hothfield side of the road between the Tutt Hill petrol station and the Holiday Inn. Both these sites would be accessed off the A20 which is already busy and an essential route when the M20 is closed for any reason. These are sites in farmed countryside. They back onto the motorway and if developed would be visible from the Pilgrims Way.

If you have questions about how these sites would work, or can suggest conditions that would be needed to make them practical eg comments on access to schools, surgeries, shops, buses etc, based on your local knowledge please do comment. We all know that road safety on the A20 is an issue. There are no proposals to change it from a single carriageway 60 mph rural main road. Whether you are sceptical or positive about what is being proposed, Ashford planners do want to listen to your local knowledge, before any decisions are made about whether any of these sites should be either taken out or modified in the next version of the Local Plan. These sites would not be in the plan if others already approved were not held up by the Government's delay in funding Junction 10A which is needed before those developments can proceed. If these sites stay in the plan all the consequences need to be considered very carefully.

The other site in Westwell that remains in the plan is the A and B sites for Travellers off Watery lane. (S44) The access to the B site at the rear has been modified, but the site is still proposed. However Ashford planners do now say they will be doing a separate Local Plan for Traveller sites.

The idea of B and B upstairs is being discussed too. That would help with the viability but also needs investment to get the accommodation up to standard. B and B is not new to

Westwell, and there might be the possibility of some external EU funding -

currently still available until March 2019.

Recycling plastic items

Plastic is one of the most popular and useful materials of today, we now use around 20 times more plastic than we did 50 years ago. Luckily, we can increase the lifespan of plastics by recycling items as many times as possible.

Ashford as a whole has been doing a fantastic job at recycling and the Borough Council is delighted with how enthusiastic residents have been with the new initiative.

With our recycling figures at their highest, we want to continue this fantastic work and encourage the community to carry on recycling more of their household waste. So let's work together to create an even cleaner, greener and greater Ashford!

There are many ways you can continue supporting Ashford's recycling initiative and make the borough a more eco-friendly place to live. Do your bit for the environment by backing Pledge4Plastics, a new government supported initiative which aims to encourage UK residents to recycle more plastics from rooms all over the house.

Recycling plastics from all around you. It can sometimes be confusing knowing which items are recyclable. Firstly, it's important to not limit recycling to only kitchen items because more than just food packaging can be recycled! A range of materials from rooms all over your house can be reused.

In the bathroom for example, items including bleach bottles, mouth wash bottles and shower gel containers can be recycled. When it comes to recycling items from your bedroom, remember things like empty face moisturiser bottles can go in your recycling bin.

And in the kitchen, you can reuse plastic cooking oil bottles, kitchen cleaning bottles and even clean plastic yoghurt pots, but not black plastic food trays

Even certain electrical materials can be recycled. Items such as electric toothbrushes, mobile phones and electronic toys can be reused provided they are placed in a tied carrier bag, next to vour refuse bin.

Understanding recycling symbols. Recycling symbols are now appearing on lots of everyday items to help us identify how different parts of the packaging can be recycled correctly.

It's important to take a look at the symbols printed on the product to determine how to dispose of it correctly.

not all packaging will have recycling label but that doesn't mean you can't recycle it.

Letter to the Parishes

August, the month when many of us will be heading off on holiday. Do you feel dissatisfied with your lot? Do you look back over your life and think if

only I had worked harder at school or travelled more or taken more risks? Do you regret your choice of career? Do you wish you could have a new car, a bigger house or more money? Do you aspire to be a famous singer, sports personality or reality TV star? Do you look with envy at other people's exotic holidays? Do you worry about the future, about things which may never happen?

Some of us have been looking at the Ten Commandments. The tenth commandment is:-

'You shall not covet your neighbour's house; you shall not covet your neighbour's wife, or male or female slave, or ox, or donkey, or anything that belongs to your neighbour.'

O.K. so slaves whether male or female, oxen and donkeys do not seem very twenty first century in any of our parishes, even in rural Kent but the underlying message is just as relevant.

The advertising industry plays on our desire to acquire things which we do not have or to buy a newer better version of something which we already have even the though the old one meets our needs perfectly well.

Many of us, dare I say most of us, and I include myself in this, probably have far more stuff than we need and when we have it we worry that we might lose it and yet we still want more. Ask yourself. Have I eaten today? Do I have access to clean water to drink? Do I have a bed in which to sleep tonight in safety? Do I have clothes to put on? Do I have access to medical care if I need it? If your answer to any one of those questions is 'yes' you are better off than the vast majority of the world population. If your answer is 'yes' to all of them well you really aren't too badly off are you?

Of course there are people in our own communities who do rely on the Foodbank and it is a disgrace that in an affluent western country foodbanks are necessary and we should help those in need, but what I really want to stress is that those of us who have sufficient or indeed more than sufficient should be grateful for it. We all want to make provision for our own future and that of our children and that is only natural but we seem to spend all our time earning money to buy things that we don't really need and which we won't have time to enjoy when we could be spending that time with our loved ones?

Many people also have another feeling of wanting more, a yearning for something which they cannot identify, a sense that there is something more to life than enduring the rat race and simply acquiring material possessions at the cost of their health and peace of mind. Christians would of course say that this yearning is for God.

Near the beginning of his Confessions St Augustine of Hippo meditating on his life and coming to relationship with God says '.... our heart is unquiet until it rests in You'. What a wonderful thought. Stop tearing about and rest in God.

So enjoy your holiday, exotic or not, and while sitting by the pool or sipping your drink of choice take time to reflect on what is important, appreciate what you have now and thank God for it.



The glory of Hothfield in August is the purple heather or ling, Calluna vulgaris. This year there were sprigs in flower already in June, and the pink cross-leaved heath, Erica tetralix, had as usual started even earlier. Calluna and Erica grow together on the dry heath, only Erica tolerates wet bog.

Richard Mabey writes of these low-growing evergreen shrubs as the raw material of frugal domestic life, along with companions bracken and gorse. So heather here could have been used for fuel (ling comes from the Anglo Saxon work lig for fire), fodder, wattle in daub, thatch, brooms (calluna is from the Greek for brush), baskets, fencing, twisted into ropes, packing material or mattress filling, the roots carved into small useful items, although tobacco pipes were made from roots of the continental tree heather, hence briar from the French for heather, bruyere. The flowers might have yielded orange dye and honey from wild bees. A local volunteer now keeps an apiary nearby. Flowering tips might have been used for tisane or to flavour and filter beer, leann froach in Scotland.

Wildlife was in amongst the heather before humans found it useful. In the same family as bilberries, rhododendrons and blueberries, it provides shelter all year for basking reptiles and birds, hopefully for nesting tree pipits one day; thousands of seeds for feeding birds, foliage food for caterpillars and grazing sheep, nectar and pollen for insects and butterflies and moths, which are food for patrolling dragonflies and birds. Heather needs nutrient poor soil and grows slowly; the progress from fresh green pioneering seedlings through maturity to the eventual collapse of gaunt woody plants is monitored and managed across the reserve.

Gardeners have a wide choice of cultivars of several species including tree and winter heathers to provide flowers almost all year round, a feast for the eye and a wonderful larder for garden wildlife.

The name Hothfield for this area, meaning heathy open land, can be traced back to around 1100 AD; also in Kent, Hoath from La hathe was used from the 13thC, in Sussex Hoathly from 1287 and Hadlegh from 1121. The names all derive from the Old English word hath meaning heather. Heathrow in around 1410 was La Hetherewe, middle English for a row of houses on or near the heath. Heath results from centuries of lowimpact grazing and felling and these names indicate how widespread heathland was and how great the losses in the southeast. Now rarer than rainforest, heathland is one of our most threatened habitats, hence Hothfield's designation as a Site of Special Scientific Interest, the grazing animals and the team of volunteers who work to clear encroaching scrub on a regular basis. There is no white heather here but we are very lucky to have this remnant of rich diversity so close by, and need to keep it connected to the living landscape around.

The heathland is open to all, including dogs kept in check; a human toddler can become terrified of dogs, not knowing that an unleashed bounding dog larger than her just wants to play. Various trails are signposted and indicated on the maps at entrances, which also give the location of the livestock. The noticeboard down the main slope from the Cade Road car park gives recent wildlife sightings.
