

## **Parish Council**

The Parish Council met on Tuesday 8th May in the parish hall. This being the Annual meeting of the Parish Council the first business was the election of Chairman: Christine Drury was re-elected as Chairman and Clive Bainbridge as Vice-chairman; this was followed by the election of Parish Council Committee members and representatives to outside organisations. The Parish Council continues to meet the criteria for the General Power of Competence, which allows it greater flexibility to deliver projects and support local groups, and without the constraints on expenditure imposed by other regulations. Larry Krause, borough councillor, gave a report on the delays to the dualling of the A28 beyond the Matalan roundabout, and on changes to the bus timetable. We were all delighted to see him back after his recent serious illness.

Minutes of the March and April meetings were approved and Matters Arising discussed. These included an update on the Local Plan; fencing on the Wheel garden to limit noise for a neighbouring property; a site meeting on Downs View green to decide the location of an electricity substation – this will be required when the overhead power lines across the playing field are put underground.

The Parish Council's Annual Accounts (the Return) were approved and will be sent to the External Auditor for audit. The first instalment of the Precept has been paid to the Parish Council by the Borough.

The financial report was presented and approved. Quotes will be sought for a french drain and associated soakaway on the access way to the parish hall, to prevent water run-off onto the playing field. A mandate from Lloyds Bank to add signatories to the Parish Council and Westwell Eye accounts was circulated for signature.

One planning application was discussed and supported. The chairman was granted permission to speak on behalf of the parish council at the Examination of the draft Local Plan on site policies S49 and S47 making it clear to the inspector that she was an impacted adjacent resident for S47.

The Parish Council must put in place policies and procedures to comply with the forthcoming General Data Protection Requirement, these will be brought to the next Parish Council meeting. The Risk Register will also be updated.

Correspondence and reports from Parish Council representatives were taken.

The meeting concluded after Any Other Business, preparations for the summer fete are ongoing with the Chairman.

The next meeting of the Parish Council is on Monday July 2nd at 7pm in the parish hall. All meetings are open to the public and all are welcome.

The DRC latrine is located in Kisima, Rutshuru, just south of the equator and close to the borders of Uganda and Rwanda. To learn the actual latitude and longitude of the latrine you will need to pay a visit to the Ladies' at the Wheel– or get a friend to!

Their current expansion is here in Kent - some of you may have seen their vineyard planted on Chartham Down.



# Letter to the Parishes

Thy Kingdom Come'! This has been the prayer on the lips of Christians all around the world during the nine days of prayer between Ascension Day and Pentecost.

Just before He was taken up into heaven, Jesus told his disciples to wait in Jerusalem and, as they waited, to pray for the Holy Spirit. Did they fully understand what they were praying for? Were they prepared for the life-hanging experience of the Holy Spirit? If they had known what lay ahead, persecution, imprisonment, false accusations and, for some of them, martyrdom, would they have continued to pray for the Holy Spirit? I wonder. Mingled with their sense of anticipation, might there also have been a touch of apprehension?

I have just returned from a conference whose title was 'What Next'? With changes in our political and social landscapes, both global and local, we may also be wondering "What next?" As I write, a historic summit between President Trump and North Korea leader Kim Jongun looks set to break down; the much celebrated renewal of friendly dialogue between the leaders of North and South Korea shows signs of strain; violent demonstrations have broken out between Israel and Palestine and the world continues to question the dominance of Russia in inter-continental conflict. Closer to home, the clock is ticking on the final Brexit agreement with so much yet to be agreed. What next indeed!

The Anglican Church is not exempt from this question as, on a global, national and local scale, the landscape appears to be changing. Less than twenty-five years ago, there were no women priests in the Church of England. Now, in some dioceses, the numbers of women clergy almost match those of men. Less than five years ago, there were no women bishops in the Church of England and now, with the most recent appointment announced a few days ago, there are 15 women who serve as Bishops in the Church of England. 'What next', we ask, for the Anglican Communion that is divided over the issue of same sex marriage and Assisted Dying, just two of the issues currently on the table for debate. Even here in our benefice, the question 'what next' lies at the heart of our "Single Parish" deliberations as we prayerfully seek the best structure that will enable us to grow and to flourish.

"What next?" For the disciples, their patient waiting and dedicated praying caused them to be ready to receive the gift promised to them at Pentecost. Through this gift, they found new confidence to step out into the next stage of their personal journeys of faith and, with others, establish the early church. Perhaps they didn't know what was round the corner but they had the courage and the wisdom to face all the issues that emerged day by day because they had willingly and faithfully prayed 'Come Holy Spirit'. This is not a prayer just for Pentecost. It is a prayer to be prayed every day of our lives as we seek God's wisdom and work with others to establish his Kingdom here on earth.

#### **Book Club May 2018**

We met to discuss Ernest Hemingway's 'A Moveable Feast'. We started by celebrating the charity we supported, organised by Margery. We donated money to help fund a toilet in The Democratic Republic of Congo. Most people in poor areas there don't have access to toilets and hygienic conditions...more about that in § this Eye elsewhere.

Back to the book. This is a collection of short stories about Hemingway's years in Paris with his first wife Hadley in the early twenties and when he was in his mid twenties. This was soon after the First World War and life in this city was quite simple. Goat herd would be driven through in the early morning and one could come down from their flat and collect fresh milk..Hemingway talks about his circle of friends, the great and the amazingly artistic, with simplicity and clarity which has always been his seemingly effortless style. We read about his friendship with Ezra Pound and F. Scott Fitzgerald and borrowing books from The Shakespeare & Co. bookshop. He was in Paris as correspondent for the Toronto Star and sold stories to different papers but was also settling in as a writer of stories. Money came in sparingly and when it did the family would be able to afford food and a trip to the

South or to the mountains. Among the friends and acquaintances are Gertrude Stein, Ford Madox Ford and James Joyce. The former had a wonderful flat in Paris with Cezannes and Picassos on her wall. She too was an aspiring writer. One sentence sums up Hemingway's admiration for Fitzgerald : "his talent was as natural as the pattern that was made by the dust on a butterfly's wings".

Our next meeting discusses poems, our own choices each, second Tuesday in June at the Wheel, 10:45am.

#### G7, the way forward?

Changes could also be coming to the parish organisation. We will be meeting to discuss this at a PCC open Session in June and are inviting anyone who wants to find out more about how changes to the church council (PCC) will effect things in Westwell. We are currently planning on holding this meeting on the evening of Monday 25th June. Further details will follow on Westwell events. Watch out for the date. from; **Ashford Highways Operations Team Kent County Council** Every year throughout the spring and summer KCC Highways & Transportation receive numerous complaints regarding trees, hedges and other vegetation, which overhang the highway from private property. This matter can pose a number of problems for people trying to use the footways, especially if they are trying to pass with buggies, wheelchairs and scooters. It would be greatly appreciated if you could ensure that any trees and hedges that are bordering the Highway are maintained and cut back to your boundary which would greatly benefit all Highway users. This will help us all keep the highway safe and prevent the need for KCC Highways & Transportation writing to you requesting that you cut back your vegetation. So that you are aware of our requirements, please refer to the text below.

If the boundary of your property borders the footway, then please be aware that:

1. The full width of the footway/pavement must be available for use by pedestrians.

2. As well, there must be a minimum height clearance over the footway/pavement of 2.1 metres/7 feet for any vegetation.

If the boundary of your property borders the carriageway, then please be aware that: 3. If you have vegetation that overhangs into the road, there must be a minimum height clearance of 5 metres/16 feet to accommodate buses and HGVs that may use the road.

4. If your property is rural, then vegetation should be 0.45 metres/11/2 feet behind the edge of the road and all signs need to be kept clear of foliage.

5. Also, we would ask that you pay special attention to your trees, hedges and vegetation if your property is on or near a junction, and/or inside the bend of the road, to maintain maximum visibility for road users.

June on wildlife Hothfield Heathlands

Last summer volunteers gave 1794 hours to KWT assisting staff on monitoring and evidence work over nine different types of landscape in 28 of Kent Wildlife Trust's 60+ reserves, including Hothfield Heathlands. For Hothfield Heathlands Warden Ian Rickards, 2017 was significant, with "the inception of a new Ecology Group within the Ashford area. The main objective for the group was to carry out a baseline botanical survey across Hothfield Heathlands. This consisted of determining the presence or absence of 55 key heathland and bog species of plant and shrub in around 200 50x50m grid squares. Local KWT staff were fortunate to have the help of a great number of enthusiastic volunteers, with 76 days of volunteer help during the 8 week monitoring season".

Ian highlighted volunteer James Rowland "who worked harder than anyone on the Hothfield project was with us on all of the monitoring days - he missed one day, to collect his zoology degree - and spent the next few weeks laboriously entering the data from all the Kent surveys onto the database at Tyland Barn HQ. The maps he has created look amazing, and will be incredibly useful in formulating the on-going management of the reserve." The heat map, on front page, shows the number (but not quantity) of the key heathland species observed in each of the squares, the darkest squares have the greatest number of species. The habitat condition report also provides positive signs of heather increase.

Alongside this work, other experts were regularly monitoring insects. As part of her MSc thesis, volunteer Lucy Carden collected data on butterflies across the grassland habitats on Hothfield, showing a big increase in small and large skippers, common blue and marbled white, due, Ian thinks, to the ex-arable fields becoming more established as permanent grassland. Small copper had a good year on the SSSI heathland areas, where the flowers of the copper's food plant, the tiny sheep sorrel, casts a bronze haze over the springy turf.
